

SENTENCE SALLEE TO SEVEN YEARS IN STATE'S PRISON

Both state and defense introduced affidavits for consideration of the court.

Ray Woodcock, found guilty by a jury of sale of meat without a stamp, with a recommendation of leniency, was fined \$100 and costs.

Henry M. Everhart, Dark Hollow section resident, was extended leniency, "with the understanding that this is to be the last granted." Everhart is under a suspended sentence from the court on a forgery charge and was convicted last spring in justice court of petty larceny.

Everhart pleaded guilty to larceny by bail in the sale of a calf belonging to Mrs. Cora Morgan. Under the terms of the sentence Everhart must pay \$5 to Mrs. Morgan today and \$5 within 10 days.

Attorney E. E. Kelly, named by the court to represent Everhart, said: "The defendant lacks understanding and sense of responsibility."

The court stated: "I will give you another chance. You will have to make up your mind you cannot live by larceny."

Floyd Sheppard, 18, of Roseburg, an escapee from the state reform school, and George L. Roberts, 20, transient, who pleaded guilty to theft of an auto belonging to Dean Pieper of this city, were each sentenced to serve two years in state prison.

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\$100,000 SAVING TO ROGUE VALLEY SEEN THIS YEAR

On the average tonnage from this district would result in a saving in round figures of approximately \$100,000 annually.

It was stated by one of the officials of the Traffic association that during the depression, the railroads have not only been faced with the falling off in business experienced by business in general, but they have seen their tonnage decrease by losses to other modes of transportation, such as trucks and water carriers.

One of the points strongly stressed in the hearings recently held throughout the country on the railroads' application for a general 10 per cent increase, was that high rates would decrease tonnage and drive it to other lines of transportation, but that lower rates would increase their tonnage to an extent that would more than offset the revenue that would come to them should the increase be granted.

"Possibly the railroads themselves became convinced of this from the information developed in the recent hearings and it may be that we will see more and more changes in the freight rate structure resulting from a desire on the part of the railroads to test the matter out," the Traffic association official said.

HOLT GIVEN SEAT BY SENATE VOTE

WASHINGTON, June 21.—(AP)—The senate today voted to seat Senator-elect Rush D. Holt, (D. W. Va.), by defeating a resolution declaring his election void on grounds of insufficient age.

His right to a seat was challenged on the ground that he had not attained the age of 30 years, set by the constitution for senate membership, at the start of his term.

The senate, in voting to seat him, decided that Holt, now being 30, had removed his ineligibility and was entitled to the seat to which he was elected.

The senate approved the seating of Holt by a vote of 62 to 17.

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

'ROBIN HOOD' OF CORSICA BEHEADED

BASTICA, Corsica, June 21.—(AP)—Andre Spada, Corsican bandit chief, who called himself a modern Robin Hood, died at dawn today on the guillotine.

His arms bound, the man convicted of at least six slayings walked unaided, erect and silent to the guillotine from a cart in the open square.

Awakened from a sound sleep, the condemned bandit refused the traditional cigarette and a glass of rum before going to his death, asserting: "It was never courage I lacked."

After communion in his cell, Spada had given his jailers a religious harangue, concluding "what I say is for you who remain, for I have been touched by divine grace and that is not given to everybody."

ROSEBURG AUTOIST HELD IN SMASHUP

EUGENE, June 21.—(AP)—Walter Day, Roseburg, was being held here today pending disposal of charges against him as a result of a collision involving his car and a machine driven by Clyde Mathers of Goshen last night. Mathers received severe injuries to his back.

Day, state police said, was going south on the Pacific highway and met the Mathers car on the overhauled crossing just south of here. The Day car is said to have crowded the other car into the railing, wrecking the machine and injuring Mathers.

Instead of stopping, officers said Day proceeded on, turning into the Willamette highway at Goshen. Witnesses gave chase, caught Day at Pleasant Hill and turned him over to police.
