

Ohio Negro Flash Outclasses Coast Stars

U. S. G. COPS TITLE BUT OWENS WINS FOUR MAIN EVENTS

Human Antelope Given Ovation by Throng; Beats Stars of Nation; No Records Smashed.

EDWARDS STADIUM, BERKELEY, Cal., June 22.—(AP)—University of Southern California's powerful track and field team won the 1935 national collegiate A. A. team championship today but a little-known negro youth from Ohio state, Jesse Owens, won the thunderous applause of 18,000 fans.

In the most amazing list of individual performances ever witnessed in the far west, Owens took first places in the 100 and 200-yard dashes, the 220-yard low hurdles and the broad jump. His efforts alone accounted for 40 of the 40 1-5 points scored by Ohio State to take second place to Southern California.

Surviving members of the 23-man Trojan team, after yesterday's trial, rolled up a total of 75 1-30 points, accounted for largely through secondary strength. The Trojans only won two first places.

But while Southern California was adding the N. C. A. A. title to its previously won Intercollegiate A. A. A. honors of a few weeks ago, limber-legged Owens was streaking down the cinder path, skipping hurdles and keeping an eye on broad jump rivals, an event in which he clinched top position in yesterday's trials.

This human antelope, who learned to run on the sidewalks of Cleveland, failed to even come close to his earlier world record bettering performances, but the assembled thousands who cheered him on were thoroughly satisfied nevertheless.

He beat just about the pick of the country's athletic stars in every event he appeared in. From the time he won the 100-yard dash until he topped off the field after making one special effort to exceed the world's broad jump record, the throngs' plaudits were for Owens. No greater ovation has ever been accorded a visiting athlete.

The two sprints, heralded as "the race of the year," developed into a one-man affair for first place. Owens won the hundred in 9.8 seconds and the furlong in 21.5.

In the short sprint he beat Eulace Peacock of Temple with George Anderson of California coming third. In the 220 he bested the tape just ahead of Anderson with Herman Neugebauer of Tulane finishing in third place. Each time Owens led from the start. Slowness of the times was attributed to a 10-mile wind that blew into the runners.

Owens' highest feat came today in the 220-yard low hurdles where he faced the defending champion, Glenn Hardin of Louisiana State. It turned out to be a romp for the negro lad. Owens led after the half way mark and was clocked in 23.4 seconds.

The victory climaxed Owens' four-way victory. He clinched the broad jump yesterday in the trials with a leap of 26 feet 1 1/2 inches. His nearest rival, Al Olson of Southern California, jumped 25 feet 8 1/2 inches today for the second position.

LASKY HURTS EYE AND LOSES BATTLE

SAN FRANCISCO, June 22.—(AP)—Although suffering from a bad cut over his left eye, Art Lasky, lanky Jewish heavyweight, today had enough eyesight left to watch his chances of fighting Jim Braddock for the championship of the world go glimmering away.

Ford Smith, a comparative unknown from Kallispell, Montana, was the villain who gave Lasky the cut and knocked his hopes of meeting Braddock in the new champ's first title defense into the discard. Smith scored a technical knockout in the sixth round of a scheduled ten-round bout here last night.

Lasky was definitely in the lead when Referee Toby Irwin stopped the fight because his eye was bleeding so badly, but Smith had surprised the fans by taking the Jewish brawler's heaviest blows and at times even outboxing his more widely-known opponent.

CLEVELAND HANDS YANKS DRUBBING

CLEVELAND, June 22.—(AP)—The Indians swung from their heels at everything the Yankee pitchers offered today and slammed their way right back into second place with a 12 to 6 victory over the league leaders in the opener of an important four-game series.

The tribe collected twelve hits from the offerings of Johnny Broaca, Johnny Murphy, Walter Brown and Jimmy Deabong and made eight of them good for extra bases. There were four home runs, including Hal Trosky's twelfth of the season, three doubles and a triple.
