## STATE HAS MONEY TO TAKE UP ALL ROAD AID FUNDS

SALEM, June 22.—(AP)—Oregon will have money available to take up all federal aid funds and other government appropriations to the state for highway construction purposes for the years 1935-36, R. H. Baldock, highway department engineer, announced today following a checkup of state revenues and match fund requirements.

The calculations assure a federal and state road building program totaling at least \$13,450,000 during the next three years, Baldock said.

Construction operations will necessarily extend over a period of at least three years since the current season is so far advanced it will be impossible to get much of the work under way before winter.

The first of the jobs to be designated for contracts, Baldock stated, will be a portion of the regular federal aid projects, which the highway commission will select from scheduled projects at a special meeting here next Tuesday. These projects, it was estimated, would aggregate about 25 per cent of the total federal aid allocation.

## EXECUTED YOUTH ADVISES PARENTS UPON CHILD CARE

CANON CITY, Colo., June 22.—(AP)—Leonard Belongia, Wisconsin farm boy, who was executed at the state prison last night for the murder of a Colorado rancher, his mother, urged them to treat their children justly and kindly.

Belongia's message, released today, was addressed to the administrators of orphan homes and penal institutions.

"Give those children of yours ten to 15 years of intelligent guidance and kindness and I'll guarantee their success as men and women," Belongia told parents. To institution heads he said: "I have been in two different orphanages and a house of correction where children eight and nine years of age knew more about life than many grown men. Some of the toughest kids I ever met were in the Roosevelt House of Correction in Chicago. Many of them in later years pulled up prison records as far as the list of your associates."

Although it is my firm belief that parents are to blame for a child's waywardness, I do not believe that they are always conscious of it. I know that my folks were not aware of neglecting me."

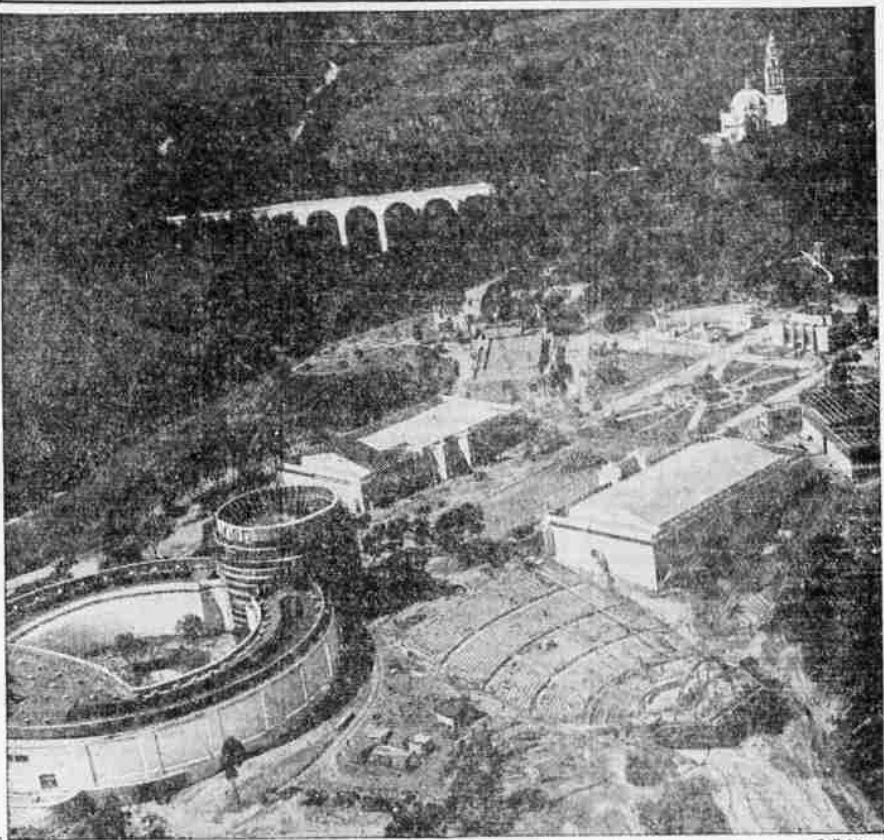

## The AUTO WAY.

This week a short discussion of an Italian car may be of interest. We believe most everyone has heard of this car sometime. It is the Fiat. This particular model we shall describe is a small model and is known as the Fiat "308." The wheelbase of the car is 88 1/2 inches and the horsepower is 20. The gas consumption ranges between 33 and 36 miles per gallon according to the conditions of the road and whether it is country or city driving. Of course that isn't the mileage they get at high speeds—in fact that is what they get when doing about 30 to 35 miles per hour. This car has the conventional three forward speeds and in addition a reverse gear and optional five wheeling. The service brakes are hydraulic and the emergency brake works on the transmission.

This car comes in four different body models. They are the two-door sedan, the four-door sedan, the two-seater roadster, and the sport two-seater. In order that you may have some idea of what the lines of 3 models of this car are like we may say that they are something like an Austin. The fourth model, the sport

two-seater doesn't look like anything we have seen before. This model is the stream-lined creation of Fiat. It has nicely flowing fenders and the top, when not in use, folds down in back completely out of sight. They also have something of a fin on the back of the car to add to its sleek, speedy lines. We do not know the exact speed of this particular model, but judging from their other cars it is probably around 60 or 70.

## Pontiac's Springs Offer Comfort and Quiet Operation

Close-fitting steel spring covers protect Pontiac's ratiated springs from dust and water, thus eliminating squeaks and rattles due to improper spring lubrication. By this method there is no danger of "frozen leaves" which are due to rust forming between the spring leaves.

To further augment quietness and comfort, Pontiac has insulated the rear spring from the axle housing with live rubber, and at the front end of the rear spring a rubber bushing lessens any tire and road noise.

On Pontiac's new standard six, "stabilized springing" is used to give a smooth, balanced drive. To attain the greatest degree of comfort and safety from this method of suspension, the chassis and engine of the new standard six have been moved forward five inches in relation to the wheels, throwing more of the weight on the front wheels, thus assuring a more even distribution of weight. Another factor contributing to greater riding ease is that much of the stiffness has been taken out of the front

springs. To give greater road steadiness at all speeds, a stabilizer bar connects the two shock absorbers, which means that shocks from severe bumps are borne by both springs and not by one alone. This bar also makes steering easier because it prevents excessive flexing of the front springs, the wheels holding their true course through heavy gravel or over the roughest roads.

## CHERRY CANNING OPENS THIS WEEK

A fear is being felt by local canning interests that the eastern markets which have in the past absorbed a large percentage of the Medford cherry production will withdraw their orders next year because of an unpredictable situation that has arisen here.

Last year, the cherry crop was in a great measure destroyed by hard rains, splitting the fruit and rendering it useless. Now this year, to add to the canners' misfortune, the crop is unusually light. To safeguard their eastern and middlewestern markets, the Rogue River Valley Canning company is making an effort to obtain all of the Royal Anne and Bing cherries possible this year, and are asking the growers to bring in their cherries just as soon as they are ripe for canning. Operation on cherries will begin this week.

## FATHER COUGHLIN RULED VIOLATOR OF CHURCH LAWS

NEW YORK, June 22.—(AP)—The Rev. Edward V. Dargin, canonist for the Roman Catholic diocese of New York and an authority on church laws, charges in the July issue of the Ecclesiastical Review that Father Charles E. Courtin violated canon law in his political utterances and in the organization of his National Union for Social Justice.

Dargin says in the article that Bishop Michael J. Gallagher of Detroit has "the right and duty to forbid" political activity by ecclesiastics and that Father Coughlin "can and should be punished" for disobeying.

Dargin writes, "that the activities of Father Coughlin constitute direct violation of canon law. Whether his activities are or are not political is a question of fact."

"It is my conviction that they are political and this conviction is based on his organization of a nationwide league, with a direct and open threat to its vote power for or against certain national policies, laws, and elective officials."

## MODERN 'MAN IN IRON MASK' DEAD

PARIS, June 22.—(AP)—The newspaper Paris Soir in a copyright article reported today the death of the de-throned Emperor of Ethiopia, Lig Yasu, in a lonely mountain top prison in the province of Harar, far from Addis Ababa.

The article, describing the former emperor's life as that of a "modern man in an iron mask" said he died six months ago but that his death had been kept secret by the government.

## HALF HOUR NIGHT GIVES FAIRBANKS BIG CELEBRATION

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, June 22.—(AP)—Today the sun set in Fairbanks and rose again in half an hour, making it the longest day in any city, anywhere.

There wasn't any night, for citizens of Fairbanks (called a holiday, stopped all business, and devoted the 24 hours of daylight to games for the children, races, a baseball game and a football game.

The ball game started at midnight and the football game at 11:30 p. m.—and without floodlights, either.

Some people went to the "summit" in cars to watch the phenomenon of the sun going down and coming right back up almost immediately, and some came by airplane to view the spectacle.

On the streets, they danced and read newspapers. Two dance halls were used because of the great crowds celebrating. Miners warmed from the hills to celebrate. Cow bells, horns and other noise makers rattled and clanged for hours.

The sun sets at midnight, but that will last only a few weeks. The process is gradual. Slowly the nights will lengthen. During the 24 hours from midnight Friday to midnight Saturday, however, Fairbanks has its piece in the sun—a 24-hour sun.

## MERCURY AT 127 IN SPANISH TOWN

ZARAGOZA, Spain, June 22.—(AP)—The temperature reached 127 degrees Fahrenheit today and many persons were prostrated.

The fifth army division, quartered here, evacuated the barracks because of the intense heat and set up a camp on the outskirts of the city.
