

G-MEN LINKED BY FAST SYSTEM OF COMMUNICATION

Special Switchboard Enables Hooking Up All 37 Offices at Once — Teletype Also in Commission

WASHINGTON, June 25.—(AP)—J. Edgar Hoover, commander of the G-men, asserted today that they have the fastest communications system of any national police agency in the world.

Describing the new communications section of the justice department's bureau of investigation, he said:

"We have a specially constructed telephone switchboard that makes it possible to hook up all our 37 offices at once."

"During the Weyerhaeuser investigation on several occasions we had telephone conferences with agents in Washington, Salt Lake City, Butte, Mont., and other places all connected."

"I have a connection with this switchboard in my home and so do several of my assistants. There you see the kidnap numbers 'National 717 and National 718' in red. Those wires are kept open."

"Within the last few days our teletype system has been put into operation. We have connections with all the 37 offices which are manned 24 hours a day."

"The advantage of this is not only faster communication with our offices but we can hook up with all police offices which have teletypes."

"I don't think that any country in Europe or any place else has what we already have—teletype."

Besides the operating staff, the communications section includes a deciphering staff. The section numbers 30 men in Washington and an operator in each of the 37 offices.

BONDS FOR WATER SOLD BY SALEM

SALEM, June 25.—(AP)—General obligation water bonds totaling \$1,100,000 were sold by the city of Salem last night at an interest rate slightly below three and one-quarter per cent a year. It was the largest bond sale in the history of the city.

The bonds were purchased by a group of five investment houses headed by the first Boston corporation of Boston, with which were affiliated the Eldredge & Co., the First Security Co., and F. M. Adams & Co., of Portland and Conrad, Bruce & Co., with offices in Salem.

Proceeds from the sale will be used to complete the purchase of the Oregon-Washington Water Service company holdings here. The transfer of the water plant to the city was expected within 30 days.

WORK RELIEF FUNDS ALLOTMENTS LISTED

WASHINGTON, June 25.—(AP)—The federal allotment board Monday recommended distribution of \$181,010.925 of the work relief fund for a variety of projects.

The principal allotment was \$118,000,000 for the federal emergency relief administration for direct aid during July.

Other recommendations included \$3,239,630 for 23 army projects and \$2,500,000 for soil conservation work by the department of agriculture.

TICKETS ON SALE FOR ASHLAND PRODUCTIONS

Tickets for the Shakespearean festival to be presented in the Elizabethan theater, on the site of the old Chautauque building in Ashland on July 2, 3 and 4, are now on sale at the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce. It was announced today.

"Twelfth Night" will be presented at 8 o'clock on the evenings of the 2nd and 4th, while "The Merchant of Venice" will be featured on the evening of the 3rd.

LOCH NESS MONSTER PUTS IN APPEARANCE

LONDON, June 25.—(UP)—The Loch Ness "monster" after months of retirement, made its first appearance of the season in the Scottish lake near Inverness Sunday.

The monster was seen by 16 persons, mostly tourists, at Halfway House, near Invermoriston. Emerging from the depths he cruised dignifiedly around the Loch Ness for about 35 minutes and disappeared in the direction of the Foyers river, eight miles north of Ft. Augustus.

Neil Hamilton Of Screen Is Visitor

Neil Hamilton, film star, was a Medford visitor yesterday, when he stopped for a few minutes while enroute from Portland to Hollywood by United Air Lines plane, to get his "ground legs" back and hobnob with his old pal, Denton Clark, now associated with the Fuller Army air school here, whom he knew at Malibu Beach, California.

Hamilton told Clark that this was his first long air trip, and that the problem of remaining well and hearty while in the air was not nearly so difficult as he had anticipated.
