ELDERLY MAN ADMITS SLAYING SWEETHEART IN HOLLYWOOD PARK
HOLLYWOOD, Cal., June 28.—(AP)—Unfolding a story of a picnic that ended in a lovers' quarrel and alleged murder, Daniel W. Nield, 61-year-old gardener, early today was booked on suspicion of slaying his 42-year-old sweetheart, Miss Frances Conklin, Hollywood stenographer.
Climaxing an investigation that began last night with the discovery of the woman's bullet-riddled body in a secluded spot near the Griffith park bridge-path, Detective Lieutenants Roy Hurst and Ray Giese said the elderly gardener confessed the slaying.
Nield, who said he had been drinking, said the quarrel arose after he accused her of "not loving him."
"It is like a nightmare—I shot her once, twice, I don't know how many times. Then I ran away," he was quoted as saying.
Nield said he went to the home of his brother, H. C. Nield, in Pasadena, and after telling him of the affair threatened to end his life by jumping off Pasadena's high Arroyo Seco bridge.
The brother persuaded him to surrender to Hollywood police.
Nield said he and Miss Conklin argued over family matters.

KETCHIKAN, Alaska, June 28. (AP) Ray Nordyke, 48, a logger and trapper, who came here in 1918 from Heppner, Ore., died last night in a hotel room, stricken with a heart attack. A sister, Mrs. B. Hempel, of Seattle, and a brother in Argentina survive.
