GOVERNOR ORDERS CLOSURE FORESTS TO CURB FLAMES

SALEM, Ore., June 29.—(AP)—Partial closing of 300,000 acres of forest land in western Douglas and eastern Coos counties to entry will be requested by the state forester early next week, it was announced today following a proclamation by Governor Martin closing areas in the Willamette and Mount Hood areas. "The forest fire hazard in Oregon this year is just a month earlier than usual," Lynn G. Cronmiller, state forester, announced, "and at the present time the situation is very serious." A general order prohibiting smoking in 15,000 acres adjacent to and in all national forests except the Sitkum, and making necessary fire fighting equipment on cars and permits for camp fires, was issued by the governor this week. The governor closed to all entry about 15,000 acres of land in the South Fork Clackamas river and the Mud Creek area in the Mt. Hood forest. No persons will be permitted within these forests. All orders recently issued become effective July 1. Partial closing of 144,000 acres of other timber lands was effected yesterday by the governor's proclamation. The greatest area, about 100,000 acres, was described as in the drainage area of the north fork of the Santiam river. Other partial closing orders affected the following areas: Ten thousand acres in the Seven Mile Hill area of the South Santiam; 5200 acres in the north fork of the Willamette river area; 19,800 acres in the Portland creek burn area of the Willamette national forest, and 9000 acres in the south Fork McKenzie river area in the Willamette forest. BORAH AT 70 SET FOR WORD BATTLE

WASHINGTON, June 29.—(AP)—On his seventieth birthday, William E. Borah of Idaho, dean of the senate, is preparing for another battle of words in his favorite forum. Reporters who sought a "birthday interview" today were shooed out of his office. The veteran Republican Independent was much more interested in the speech he is planning to make against legislation which the New Deal wants to bolster the AAA against court attacks.
