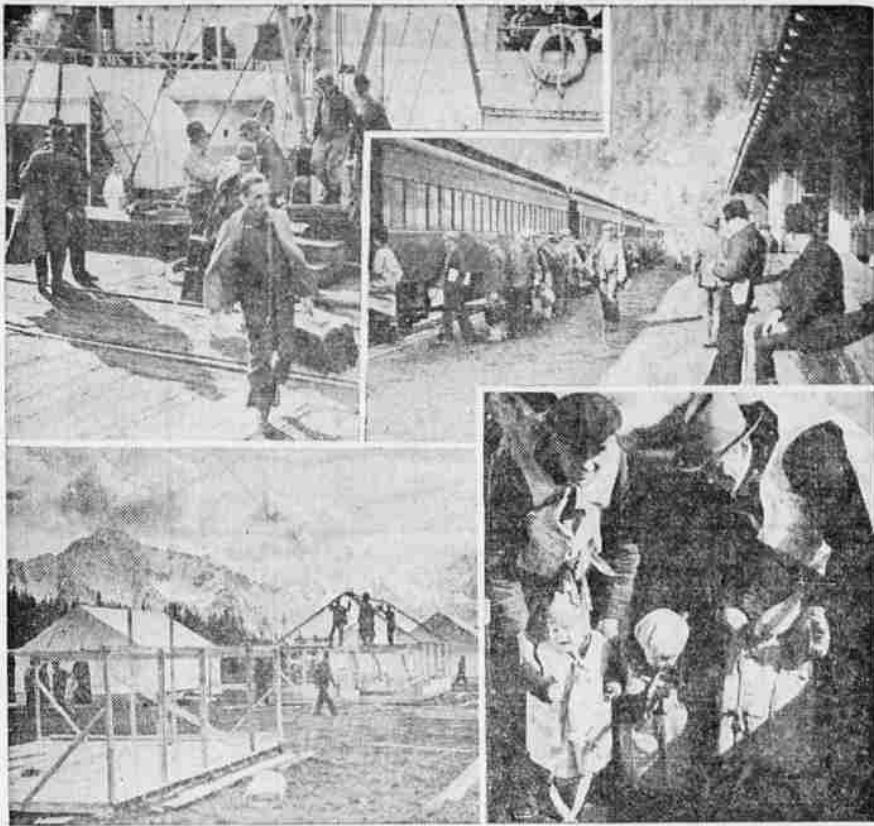


MINNESOTA PIONEERS SETTLE IN ALASKA

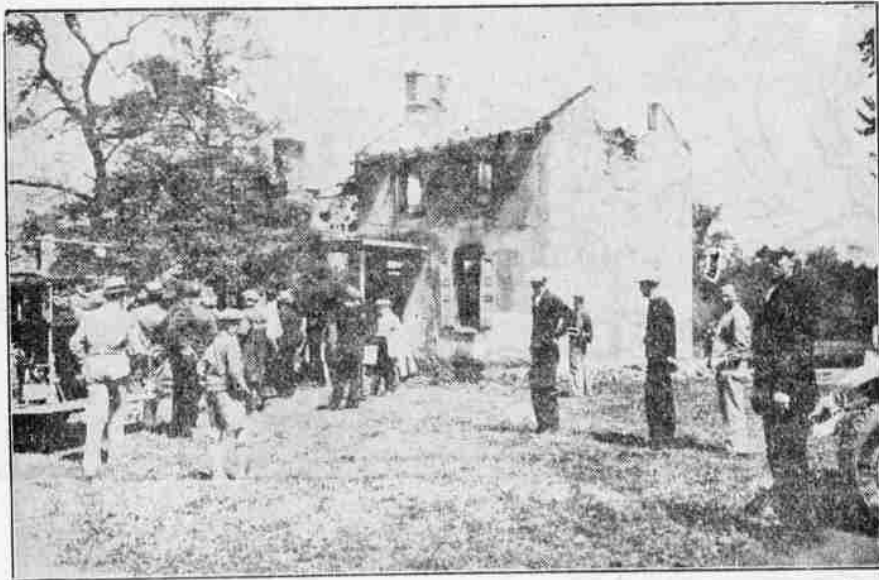

EARLY MORNING FIRE KILLS WIFE, 4 TOTS



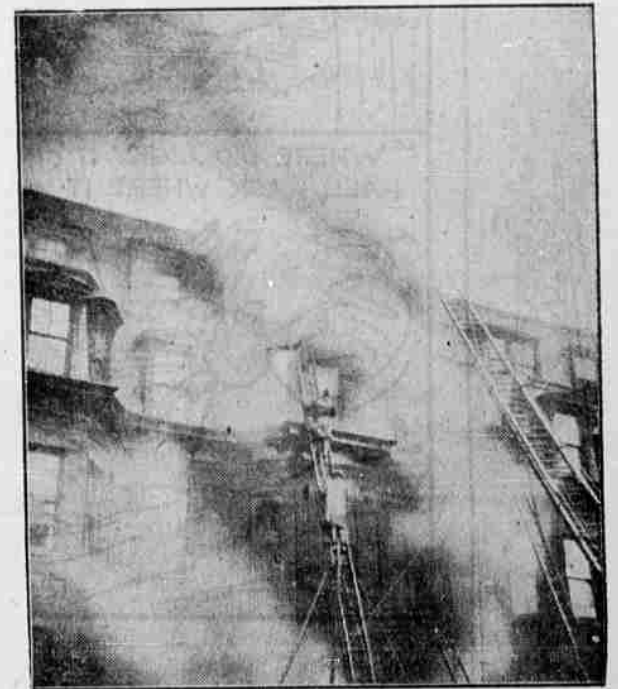
This is all that was left of the home of Frank Newcomb at Stanton, Del., when an early-morning fire killed his wife and their four small children. (Associated Press Photo)

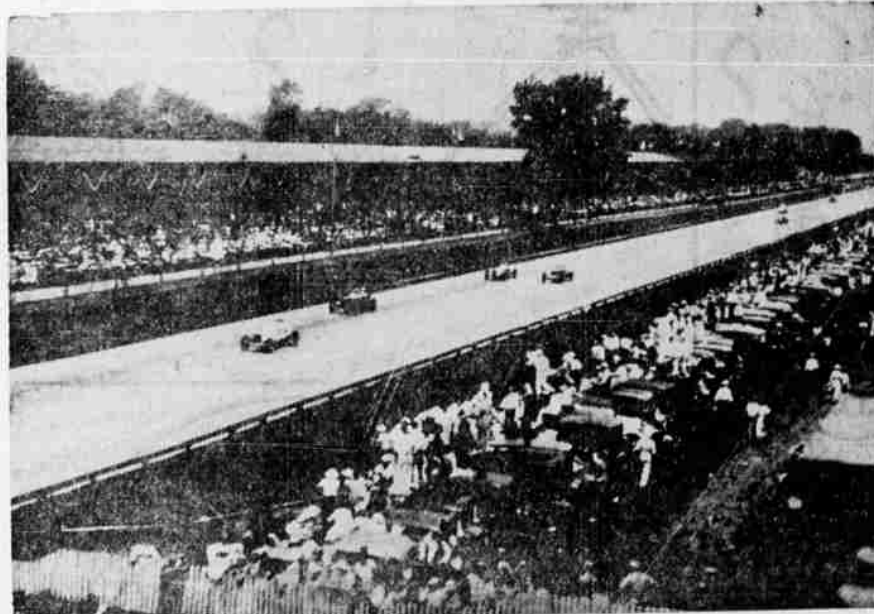
