Before the family fireplace, converted into an altar, from which bloomed white carnations in a bed of green moss banked with ferns and palms and lighted with tall white tapers, the service was read in the presence of 85 guests. On each side of the fireplace was a tall basket filled with large white snapdragons, completing the cool summer setting of green and white.

Gowned in a heavy crepe back satin model of white, finished with peacock train, owl neckline and full sleeves gathered into long, fitted cuffs, the bride wore on her head a Juliet cap fashioned from a bit of real lace, a family heirloom, from which flowed her tulle veil beyond the folds of her train.
