### NAB SUSPECT IN MURDER JUSTICE HUGHES' NEPHEW

DETROIT, Mich., June 29.—(AP)—A man who police said they are certain is William Lee Ferris was returned to Michigan tonight to face questioning in the slaying of Howard Carter Dickinson, prominent New York attorney and nephew of Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes.

Dickinson's body was found Thursday morning in Rouge park here. It bore two bullet wounds, either of which would have been fatal, physicians said.

The suspect told Fort Wayne, Ind., police, who arrested him at noon today as he entered a hotel where three young women companions were registered, that he was Art Renale of Kansas City. Michigan, state police officials said, however, that his fingerprints checked with records of Ferris.

The women said they were Loretta Jackson, 27, and Floie Jackson, 24, sister, and Lillian Winles, also 24. They also were returned to Michigan. Michigan state police and officers from Detroit bundled the four into two automobiles and rushed them across the state line to a state police barracks at Jonesville, Mich., as soon as it was learned that they would offer no objection to extradition.

Frahm said Ferris told him that he had hitch-hiked from Detroit to Kansas City last Tuesday, the day before Dickinson was shot to death, and had gone from there to Chicago before he came to Fort Wayne.

Frahm said Ferris claimed to have traveled by interurban from Chicago to Fort Wayne, but said an investigation showed there was no interurban at the hour he named.

### NATION 'IN RED' OVER 3 BILLIONS END FISCAL YEAR

WASHINGTON, June 29.—(AP)—After collecting 52 cents for every dollar spent, the treasury today closed its books upon the fiscal year with a deficit of nearly \$3,500,000,000.

With two days' transactions still to be reported in detail, expenditures exceeded revenues by \$3,472,000,000 as compared with \$3,381,000,000 for all but two days of the fiscal year of 1934. The decrease in the size of the deficit was due to a jump in receipts both above last year and official estimates, and less-than-planned spending.

Revenues totaled \$3,788,000,000 as compared with \$3,488,000,000 last year, and budget bureau estimates of \$3,711,000,000.

On a basis of cents collected for dollars spent, this year showed an increase of 8 cents. Last year that figure was 44 cents collected for each dollar expended.

The cost of running the governmental departments, termed "general" expenditures by the treasury as distinguished from emergency outlays, fell within revenues, a point which administration spokesmen repeatedly have emphasized.

This was true regardless of the fact that during the year, expenditures through the agricultural adjustment administration, previously classified as emergency, were shifted to the "general" category. These aggregated \$558,000,000.

Without including the AAA disbursements, President Roosevelt had estimated general expenditures at \$3,322,000,000. They were \$7,703,000,000, including the AAA, the actual expenditures were less than the estimates.

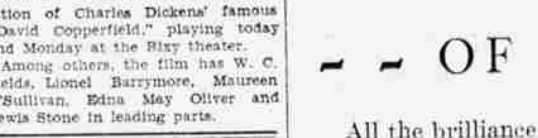
