R. W. Price, manager of Crater Lake Hotel Co., announced that boat service was to begin immediately, and with fishing conditions excellent, many are expected to take advantage of angling and pleasure cruises. The lodge is operating at full capacity, with dining service open for the first time in two years.

Stage service from this city started today, with two stages scheduled to leave immediately after visiting the hotels and meeting the 8:15 and 9 o'clock morning trains.

There were many visitors at the lake yesterday, when a snowfall had been continuing three days offered its novelty to the park's attractions.
