

ANDREW PEDERSON TO LAST REWARD

Andrew O. Pederson passed away at his home, 122 North Ivy street, Sunday evening after an illness since last Christmas from bronchial trouble. Mr. Pederson was born in Norway, March 11, 1848, and came to the United States in 1871, living in various cities, where he followed the trade of painting, finally settling in Decorah, Iowa, where he resided for 25 years.

Mr. Pederson was united in marriage to Olava Nordgaard, November 24, 1888, near Decorah, and to this union two children were born. He is survived by his widow, Olava; son, Norman Pederson, of Saskatchewan, Canada, and daughter, Mrs. Frank Harris, of Roseman, Manitoba, Canada.

Deceased was a man of fine upright character, and an ardent member of the English Lutheran church. He with his wife had made Medford their home for the past eight years.

His son, Norman, is on his way to Medford from Canada to be here for the services and to be with his mother.

Funeral services will be conducted from the Peril Funeral Home, Friday at 2:30 p. m., Rev. George Kabele of the English Lutheran church officiating. Interment will take place in the Medford I. O. O. F. cemetery.

AFFIDAVIT FILED IN AID OF SALLEE

The motion avers the "complaint contains unnecessary foul, filthy, obscene and disgusting allegations," that should "not be permitted to encumber the records," and the grounds they were introduced, "for the purpose of disgracing and humiliating the defendant."

DIVORCE COMPLAINT ERASURE IS SOUGHT

A restraining order directed against Mathias Sherman (Dutch) Welch, prohibiting him from removing \$2000 on deposit in the Postal Savings department, in the Ashland postoffice, and claimed by his sister, Mrs. Ada Beckwith, has been issued in circuit court. The court further orders that a copy of the restraining order be served upon the Ashland postmaster.

Welch is made a defendant in a suit filed by the plaintiff last week in which she alleges Welch deposited the money in his own name, and seeks its return.
