



### ROGUES SIGN TWO FOR TOUGH TILTS IN CURRENT WEEK

When the Medford Rogues leave Medford at 5 o'clock tomorrow morning for Crescent City, they are embarking upon a tough stream. They will not only meet the fast K. P. organization in the California city on the 4th, but on the 5th will try to win with Grants Pass, the team that has thrice defeated them this year.

On the 7th, Sunday, they will again play Grants Pass, this time in Medford. In order to save Hess for the last two games, Manager Hoffard will start Bouman, former Ashland twirler brought to southern Oregon by John Milus, former big-leaguer. Bouman twisted his fast curves about the Rogues necks so effectively in the first Medford-Ashland encounter that the locals can't forget it, and expect him to do the same against the coast team.

Bouman has his release from the Ashland club, signed by Milus, manager before "Chief" McLean took over the reins, according to Hoffer. He has been angling to play with the Rogues for some time, wishing to take advantage of the fast Medford support, according to the Medford manager.

Another strong link will be added to the Rogues chain in the person of Gus Arnie, who has returned to the local war after a brief fling in the Treka circuit. Arnie has played almost errorless ball on the second sack for the Rogues all year, and on several occasions has unlimbered his batting timber to smack out three-bag clouts. He is also a pitcher of some merit, although rusty, he has pitched three Ashland batters in one inning in a recent game.

The Rogues lineup as announced today will be: Kenton, Courtney and Hoffer in the field; Welton on the initial sack; Arnie on 2nd, Cavelli at short; Donovan at 3rd, and with Bouman chucking to Bouchard behind the bat. Bodi will act as utility player.

### ANCIENT STARS IN BASEBALL GAME

SPRING VALLEY, N. Y., July 3.—(AP)—Tobias Wildstein, who didn't play baseball as a boy because the game hadn't been invented, showed a cheering crowd how it should be done yesterday when he flipped off his catcher's mask, grabbed a bat, threw in from a fielder and neatly tagged out Max Rander, charging in from third with what would have been the winning run.

Wildstein is 109, Hender a mere kid of 92. The catcher's sparkling play saved the day for the inmates of the Sons and Daughters of Israel home, battling against the institution's officers on the annual outing.

The three-tuning contest ended in a 0-0 tie. Nathan Rakover, 90-year-old pitcher for the inmates, was master of the situation throughout, allowing only three hits. The average age of the inmates' team was 94.

### CUYLER THROUGH AS BIG LEAGUER

CHICAGO, July 3.—(AP)—Hazen "Kiki" Cuyler, veteran center fielder with the Chicago Cubs, today was unconditionally released, said advice received from Cincinnati where the Cubs are playing.

Cuyler, once one of the fastest and most colorful players in the National league, came to the Cubs in 1927 from the Pittsburgh Pirates in a trade for Earl Adams and Floyd Scott. During the eight years he played with the Cubs, Cuyler fell under the 300 mark in hitting only once.

During his 14 years in the major leagues, Cuyler batted at a .331 clip. He has played with four championship clubs, but participated in only three world's series, being kept on the bench by Manager Donie Bush of the Pirates in the 1927 series.

Waivers were asked on him three days ago, but not a club in the National league wanted him.

### BUDGE DEFEATED BY GERMAN STAR

WIMBLEDON, England, July 3.—(AP)—Baron Gottfried von Cramm, German Davis Cup player, eliminated Donald Budge of Oakland, Cal., today to gain the final round of the all-England singles tennis championship with Fred Perry, defending titleholder.

After putting up a remarkable offensive against the German player in the first two sets, Budge fell into errors and was set down in four sets, 4-6, 6-4, 6-3, 6-2.

Perry continued for his arch British Empire foe, Jack Crawford of Australia, whom he met in the final of last year's championship. The English star split the first two sets with Crawford and then crowded on pressure to close out against him the fourth, winning by scores of 6-2, 3-6, 6-4, 6-4.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 3.—(AP)—Superbly confident that he will dispose of Young Corbett III in their 10-round middleweight battle here tomorrow, Lou Brouillard of Worcester, Mass., plumed himself today for another San Francisco fight.

"I'll be ready to fight Ray Actis two weeks after I knock out Young Corbett," said Brouillard, chuckling at the suggestion he might be troubled by the Fresno's famous left hand.

Although light veterans liked Brouillard for his ruggedness and ability to hit, the popular Corbett remained a 10 to 5 favorite.

### LOUIS-LEVINSKY BOUT SLATED FOR CHICAGO

CHICAGO, July 3.—(AP)—The Joe Louis-King Levinsky heavyweight fight will be staged in Comiskey park, home of the Chicago White Sox, on the night of August 7, it was decided today.

The bout was set for ten rounds. Louis, the sensational Detroit negro who capped his rapid rise in the heavyweight ranks with a six-round knockout of Primo Carners, was represented by his co-managers, John Roxborough and Julian Black.

HOOK FIRST STEELHEAD ON LOWER ROGUE BY FLY GOLD BEACH, July 3.—(Sp.)—The first steelhead reported taken on a fly on the waters of the lower Rogue river was at Foster creek, about 40 miles upstream from here last Thursday morning. ### PORTLAND BUTTER SUPPLIES SMALL

PORTLAND, July 3.—(AP)—Light supplies in the butter market were being readily sold early today, with prices unchanged on 92 score, but lower by one cent on 90 score and one-half cent on 89 and 91. Demand for all grades was brisk, especially from shipping brokers. Liberal arrivals from the mid-west at southern coast markets caused considerable discussion locally, with the result that accumulations were avoided.

EGG prices continued steady today, with receipts moderate in volume but fully adequate for local and shipping needs. Jobbing quotations remained unchanged. A strong demand seems to begin for top quality goods.

Rather light volume of live poultry receipts were cleared off the local market readily, with paying quotations unaltered. Dressed poultry was active, with prices firm.
