Portland Whale AGAIN IN COURT

Portland, Ore., July 6.—(AP)—Egbert's body lies pickled on a plank, but court action keeps right on.

Egbert was the whale which made its appearance in the Willamette river, 100 miles from the sea, early in 1932. Thousands watched him stir up whitish waves. Later on other thousands, at a dime each, got a close-up view of his (or her) remains.

Circuit Judge Hay today ruled the remains belong to Oregon and that Edward O. and Joseph T. Leonard, who assertedly harpooned Egbert and put him in a showcase, must produce the body or \$1000.

The whereabouts of "Moby Mary" or Egbert is unknown. What the state would do with its body, if it appears, also is unknown. The next step is up to the Lessards. Anyway, it appears that Oregon is to be a richer state—either by \$1000 or one dead whale. In its replevin action to harpoon either the whale's carcass or one brand, the state cited the English law of the Year of Our Lord, 1324, when the English parliament turned over to the crown all whales found within the three-mile limit.

Since the whale was killed in Oregon waters, it was property of the state in absence of the crown, the state contended.
