

Mrs. Moody Defeats Helen Jacobs in Tennis Comeback

NET GODDESS BY BRILLIANT RALLY CONQUERS RIVAL

Loser in Daze at Finish—17,000 Cheer Dramatic Victory — Miss Jacobs' Lead Cut.

MIMBLEDON, Eng., July 6.—(AP)—Helen Willis Moody, poker-faced darling of Wimbledon's galleries for more than a decade, reclaimed the world's feminine tennis championship today with as fine and gallant a last-ditch rally as the game has ever seen.

Heading into what seemed certain defeat and frustration in the comeback campaign that has stirred the tennis world, the 29-year-old San Francisco matron dramatically overcame a 2-5 deficit in the third and deciding set of her match with Helen Jacobs, American title-holder for three years, downed her arch rival, 6-3, 3-6, 7-5, and annexed the all-England singles crown for the seventh time.

Seventeen thousand fans who sat or stood through the struggle veered upon hysteria before Miss Jacobs' championship final 1933 when, suffering from a back injury, she walked off the court in the third set with Miss Jacobs leading, 3-0. She was accused then of quitting, of depriving Miss Jacobs of a chance for a clean-cut, undisputed victory.

Today, however, she gave a conclusive rebuttal to any one who ever questioned her fighting heart. Almost as though she willed it, Mrs. Moody again gave her fighting adversary a three game advantage in the third set, the same advantage Miss Jacobs had enjoyed at Forest Hills. She even spotted Miss Jacobs a 6-2 lead later in the set and once, in the ninth game, had match point staring her in the face.

Then like an avenging goddess, she won five straight games from one of the game's fighters who ever dominated tennis shorts, and pulled the match out of the fire.

When the final point kicked the dust over the baseline, the winner ecstatically tossed her racket over her shoulder almost into the bleacher crowd and literally raced to grasp her defeated rival's hand.

A Weary Loser
Miss Jacobs stood up bravely as they walked off side by side and the crowd stood and roared its approval for many minutes.

Then in her dressing room, she lay prostrate for 45 minutes and on the verge of tears.

"Helen deserved to win," Miss Jacobs said falteringly. "I just couldn't get that match point."

Also tucked out but in much better shape than her rival, Mrs. Moody said:

"Helen played gloriously. I never expected to win."

One lineament wrenched for the fact that Miss Jacobs played the last three games in a virtual daze.

"We had to tell her it was her service in the final game," he said. "What a wonderful fighter she is."

Had she been fresh, Miss Jacobs undoubtedly would have won the match in the ninth game of the final set when she went to the net for what appeared to be a simple cill or Mrs. Moody's weak lob. But, at match point, Miss Jacobs seemed unable to lift her racket high enough for the decisive stroke and hit futilely instead into the net.

Later with the count at 5-5, Miss Jacobs needed only one point to break Mrs. Moody's service and gain what might have been a decisive 6-3 lead, but once more she drove into the net.

She never had another chance as Mrs. Moody poured terrific drives into the back corners.

The entire picture of the match in retrospect was of Mrs. Moody hitting out bravely, clipping the sidelines and controlling play throughout. On the other side of the net Miss Jacobs shuttled endlessly across the baseline, getting her racket on what seemed to be impossible drives, never conceding a point until she had given every ounce of effort she could muster.

Paul Dean, indisposed by a stomach illness today, will open the doubleheader tomorrow. Manager Dreesen announced that Kiki Cuyler, veteran outfielder released by the Chicago Cubs, would report to the Reds Wednesday.

SEATTLE, July 6.—(AP)—With final arrangements made today for a home-and-home football series with the University of Minnesota, Coach Jimmy Phelan and his University of Washington grid warriors face an almost impossible schedule in 1936.
