LAW HITS RADIO 'ADS' FOR DRUGS

SALEM, July 6.—(AP)—Radio advertising by news stands or general stores of drugs and drug departments, is prohibited under the Oregon laws, Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle ruled today.

The opinion stated "advertisement by radio, which is within the term 'otherwise' in the statute is a means of advertising, and I take it that news stands or general stores are not in active charge of a registered pharmacist, or during his temporary absence, of a registered pharmacist." The question was asked by the Oregon board of pharmacy.

LOST MOTHER AND SON FOUND SAFE

YAKIMA, Wash., July 6.—(AP)—Mrs. Thomas Victorson of Tieton and her son, Henry, 10, after wandering in thick timber for two nights and two days, were found early tonight by a searching party near Rimrock lake in the mountains 70 miles west of here. The sheriff's office in Yakima was notified by telephone that Mrs. Victorson and the boy were suffering from exhaustion and hunger but otherwise were unharmed. Their clothing was torn to shreds by dense underbrush through which they struggled. The pair left a family picnic party for a walk July 4 at Clear Lake. When they did not return by nightfall, forest rangers were notified and searching parties which at one time numbered at least 175 men were sent into the Clear Lake district.
