

### LEMUEL T. WILSON VETERAN OF INDIAN WARS, TO REWARD

Lemuel T. Wilson passed away suddenly at his home in Jacksonville July 6, 1935, of heart disease. He was born at Burlington, Iowa, January 1, 1861. He was married to Catherine Bonham, Aug. 10, 1876 who passed away March 12, 1900. He married Mary Lusher May 1, 1901 who survives him as do four children by his first marriage, Mrs. Geo. Garrison, Coeur d'Alene, Idaho; Mrs. Odelle West, Medford, Oregon; Clay Wilson, Kellogg, Idaho; Vivian T. Wilson, Medford, Oregon; also six grandchildren, two residing here, Mrs. Katherine Wendt, Jacksonville and Orville Wilson, Medford; six great-grandchildren, also two sisters and one brother, Mrs. Lizzie Taylor, Lawrence, Kansas; Mrs. Rhoda Fritch, Tacoma, Wash., and Raymond T. Wilson, Kellogg, Idaho.

Mr. Wilson was a pioneer of the early west, having crossed the plains at the age of 16 in Alexander Major's ex train. His contacts with his fellowmen were the only education he knew but they served to impress upon him that truth and honor were attributes of a good man and which tenets he steadfastly kept.

He was dearly beloved by young and old in every community in which he lived and his passing takes another pioneer of the west to his last reward.

He served as U. S. Indian scout in the Indian wars of 1874 to 1881 under the command of General Nelson A. Miles. His record as a scout is in the U. S. History of Wars in the Congressional Library at Washington, D. C.

Funeral will be held Wednesday, July 10th at Bert's Funeral Home, conducted by D. E. Millard, interment in Siskiyou Memorial Park.

### HITTSOON MINING SUIT CONTINUANCE ARGUED, WIMBERLY ON BENCH

A motion seeking a continuance of the trial date of George M. Roberts and others, against W. E. (Jed) Hittson, until a suit pending in the California court is held, was argued today in circuit court before Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly of Douglas county. The California action is scheduled to be heard next September. The legal action revolves about the ownership of the "Lucky 13" and "Ruby" mining claims in Siskiyou county, a short distance over the Oregon-California state line.

Hittson in asserted mining operations last winter on the contested property, removed upwards of \$50,000 in gold. The plaintiffs seek an accounting of the gold and adjudication of title.

News of the discovery created a wide flurry of interest in mining circles throughout the Pacific coast. The title is highly involved, and is complicated by transfers of ownership. The California action was filed in the fall of 1929. The findings of Judge Littrell of Siskiyou county were not entered of record at the regular time the defense alleged.

Judge Wimberly was assigned to the case when an affidavit of prejudice was filed by the defense, against Judge Norton.

The defense is represented by Attorney Allison Moulton and the plaintiffs by Attorneys George M. Roberts and William McAllister.
