

NIGHT CLUB GIRL ASSAULTED, SLAIN FOLLOWING PARTY

Brother of Escort Admits Attack, But Denies Murder—Eight Couples Drank Heavily Is Evidence

VAN BUREN, Ark., July 9.—(UP)—Mary Isabel Mahar, plump little 14 year old night club performer, was murdered by "persons unknown" after a criminal assault, a coroner's jury decided today.

Her body, almost nude, was found floating in a creek Saturday morning. She had been missing since a hilarious Fourth of July celebration at a country club near here.

Held in jail in Fort Smith is Clyde Trammell, 28, motorcycle machinist, the brother of Mary's sweetheart. Prosecutor Finis Batchelor said Trammell admitted assaulting the girl when he found her wading in a creek near the club house in her undergarments.

Trammell denied killing her. His brother, Monte, who was said to have been keeping company with Mary for 10 months, and who was her escort on the night of the fatal party, is "standing by" his brother, the prosecutor said.

Dr. B. Kirkland, who performed the autopsy, said she died from a broken neck. Her lungs contained no water, he said, indicating she was dead when thrown into the creek.

Eight couples were on the party and most of them drank heavily, Batchelor said. Clyde Trammell's companion was Dorothy Karna, 16. It was his first "date" with her.

The two girls, Dorothy and Mary, left the club house, went to the creek bank, disrobed and began wading. Clyde saw them from the club, which sits on a mound overlooking the stream, and went to the scene.

He encountered Mary on the opposite bank from where her clothes lay, chased her into some bushes and attacked her, Batchelor quoted the prisoner as saying.

Dorothy told the jury she saw Clyde Chase Mary, but did not witness the attack. No actual witnesses had been found, but Batchelor was looking for two persons who were reported to have watched the attack while they sat under a tree "sobbing up."

Clyde insisted that Mary ran into the creek after the attack and he never saw her again. A search was started for her Friday morning, but the body was found downstream by a farm woman.

Mary came here about a year ago from a farm near Spiro, Okla., and worked in a night club near Ft. Smith, Batchelor said, while excitement was high over the case, he expected no violence because the girl was little known here.

"I need a little more evidence before I file murder charges," the prosecutor said.

Circuit Judge J. O. Kincaid said a special session of the grand jury would be called Wednesday to investigate the crime.

FUGITIVE'S VISIT TO FORMER WIFE BRINGS CAPTURE

SAN FRANCISCO, July 9.—(UP)—For 10 years Clarence Mitchell, 33, a fugitive from justice, worked and wandered, hoping that some day he might see the son born to his wife just before his arrest on a robbery charge in Missouri.

Today Mitchell was fingerprinted and photographed, back in jail.

"Somebody turned me in," he commented dully. "Well, whoever it was will collect a \$500 reward they had out for me."

"Two weeks ago I was in Kentucky," he said. "I heard my wife was living in San Francisco. I got out here as fast as I could. She had divorced me and married a man named Clarence French. She told me she already had got an interlocutory divorce from him."

"I saw the boy, Verdane. I told my wife that I wanted her to come back to me—that we would start all over again. She said she would think it over. I saw them every day."

"Then someone turned me in."

Mitchell jumped \$10,000 bail on a robbery charge in St. Louis in 1926. Police today grilling him regarding the murder of Joseph Mogler, who furnished the \$10,000 bail bond and was found slain a short time after Mitchell's escape. Mitchell denied having returned to St. Louis after jumping bond, and said that he was a fugitive in Michigan when he read of Mogler's slaying.

NORTON REVERSED BY HIGHER COURT IN WATSON CLAIM

The state supreme court in an opinion in the case of Dan Watson against George L. Jantzer, has reversed the lower court findings of Circuit Judge H. D. Norton, in favor of Jantzer.

The action revolved about the sale by Jackson county of a homestead in the Prospect area, for delinquent taxes, to Jantzer, a sawmill operator. The homestead belonged to Watson, and the delinquent taxes amounted to approximately \$133. Watson, after the sale filed suit to quiet title.

District Attorney George A. Coddling states that "the ruling might possibly affect current tax delinquency foreclosures, scheduled to start next Monday, but no definite policy would be determined, until the full text of the supreme court decision was received."

According to Attorney George M. Roberts, who represented Watson, the constitutionality of the Oregon law providing for delinquent tax sales was not involved, but the appeal was based on the procedure, holding that "no publication of the summons had been mailed to Watson," as required by state law. The state contended that the publication was sufficient under the law.

"Jantzer is now logging the land. He was issued a certificate of title by the county court."

ABSENT-MINDED MEDIC IGNORES HOLDUP'S GUN

OAKLAND, Calif., July 9.—(UP)—It had been a busy day for Dr. E. A. Jackson, so he scarcely heard a youth mutter, "stick 'em up," as he stood on a downtown street. Absent-mindedly the doctor stared at him. "What did you say?" he inquired, politely. "Aw, snucks. I haven't the heart," the youth remarked, pocketing his revolver. He walked away.

RECORDS 15,000 SUICIDES THEN TRIES IT HIMSELF

NEW YORK, July 9.—(UP)—Jacob Anekstein, 51, who as clerk in the chief medical examiner's office, recorded more than 15,000 suicides since 1909, hanged himself in his apartment today.

5 MILLION PRESENT GIVEN ROCKEFELLER ON 96TH BIRTHDAY

LAKEWOOD, N. J., July 9.—(UP)—John D. Rockefeller received a \$5,000,000 present from insurance companies on his 96th birthday yesterday.

The money was returned to the former oil magnate because he had outlived the actuarial tables, which do not go above 95.

A spokesman indicated for the first time the aged philanthropist might never again play golf. His favorite game was now "too strenuous" for him.

An electric elevator was installed in the three-story house so that the old man would not have to climb stairs, it was revealed.

Two hundred telegrams and 800 letters were received from all over the country.

Armed guards patrolled the estate, stopping all newspapermen and photographers. One slipped in through the gate, but was denied permission to enter the house.

CARKIN AND COURT CONFER ON TAXES

John H. Carkin of Salem, member of the state tax commission and former local resident, appeared this morning before the county court relative to tax matters before the county and the tax commission.

The county court today also studied the old age pension law. The federal old age pension bill is not definitely settled by congress and it conflicts with the state old age pension law upon age and length of residence qualifications of applicants.

The federal law, as now written, provides for the state and county to pay \$15 and the government \$15 per month, with a maximum of \$30 monthly. The federal law fixes the age at 65 years and the state law at 70 years. The state law requires 15 years' residence in the state and the federal law fixes no residence period.

County Judge Day said today there was nothing the county court could do but continue with its present policy of payments until the conflicting clauses of state and federal law were reconciled.

FORECLOSURE ON GORE IS ARGUED

Arguments were heard yesterday in circuit court before Judge Carl E. Wimberley of Douglas county in the foreclosure suit of the California Joint Stock Land bank against W. H. Gore, pioneer farmer. The court took his ruling under advisement for a week and suspended legal action for the same period. The suit involves the Gore property on the Jacksonville highway.

The action reverted back into the circuit court when the United States supreme court recently held the Frazer-Lemke act unconstitutional. The defendant had anticipated applying for farm relief provided under that law. The defense claimed that certain credits had not been listed in favor of Gore, which had been remitted. The amount involved was said by attorneys to be between \$100,000 and \$200,000.

Gore is represented by Attorney George M. Roberts and the Joint Stock Land bank by Attorney A. E. Clark of Portland.

SPRAY FOR MOTH IS ADVISED SOON

Second brood codling moths are making their appearance. All varieties of pears and apples should be sprayed by July 15, according to L. G. Geutner, entomologist of the Southern Oregon experiment station, and C. B. Cordy, assistant county agent.

Use three pounds of powdered arsenate of lead to one hundred gallons of water. Cover all fruits and leaves thoroughly.

If spider mites are present on pears, lead and injury is appearing, a combination oil emulsion, lead arsenate spray may be applied as follows: One and one-quarter gallons of light medium or medium summer oil emulsion, one-half pound spreader and two pounds of lead arsenate to one hundred gallons of water. Spread so as to wet the under sides of the leaves thoroughly.

It is not advisable to use oil in second brood sprays on apples, because it may complicate the residue removal at harvest time.

PIRATE CRAFT IS FOUND ABANDONED

LONG BEACH, July 9.—(UP)—Five hooded pirates who raided a sea going gambling casino four miles off the California coast, looting the ship of \$35,000 in cash and jewelry, apparently had escaped inland, department of justice men said today, after a waterlogged boat was found offshore.

The boat, apparently scuttled by the pirates who slipped out of the fog, boarded the gambling ship, "Monte Carlo" and shackled 10 members of the crew, a woman and the casino manager, was towed to port by coast guard patrol boats.

BELIEF IN SIGNS PUTS ROBBER BEHIND BARS

NEW YORK, July 9.—(UP)—Charles Conroy, 41, followed the advice of the "don't write-telegram" signs and today was in jail. A telegram asking Chicago relations for money enabled police to arrest him in connection with three bank robberies.

STRIKERS DEMAND USE OF AUTOS ON RELIEF

CAMDEN, N. J., July 9.—(UP)—Fifteen hundred striking employees of the New York shipbuilding corporation deserted picket lines today and marched to the courthouse plaza where they demanded permission to use their automobiles while on relief rolls.

CARNIVAL TO OPEN ON JACKSONVILLE ROAD

The carnival's coming, tra-la, tra-la! The Steffen's Superior Shows, the carnival which met with popular acclaim while playing in the Ashland Lithia park during the 4th of July celebrations, has been set up on the Jacksonville highway just west of the city limits, and will open to the public tonight.
