Recital of Emanuel Bay Postponed Until Wednesday Evening

Emanuel Bay, Russian pianist, will play in recital at the Baldwin Recital hall Wednesday, July 17 at 8:30 o'clock instead of on Tuesday evening, it was made known here yesterday when word was received from Seattle. Mr. Bay is expected to arrive in Medford Tuesday afternoon.

While time is short for making arrangements, despite the one day postponement, music lovers from Grants Pass, Ashland, Central Point and Jacksonville have promised their support, according to word received here, in anticipation of an evening of fine music.

American, Par East and European press comments acclaim Mr. Bay as an exceptional pianist, possessing brilliant technique and a rare sense of ensemble playing.

While touring with Efrem Zimbalist, Mr. Bay was given credit for a great deal of the success of Zimbalist's concerts and was said by critics to possess artistic qualities rarely combined in one personality.

Mr. Bay is one of the young Russian artists who were graduated from the Petersburg Conservatory immediately preceding the World War, which postponed his arrival in America until after he had established in Europe a reputation as a brilliant pianist early in his career.
