**FIRST METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH - Main and Laurel**  
On August 31, 1883 Bishop J. M. Walden presiding over the Oregon Annual Conference at Roseburg, Oregon, appointed Rev. William G. Simpson to preach at Ashland and Medford. At that time there was no society formed in Medford.  
On November 15th of that year Rev. Simpson formed a Methodist class and services were held for some time in the original Washington school building.  
In 1887 arrangements were made with the Presbyterians whereby the Methodists might have the use of their church building once a month. In 1888 Howard's Hall, located where the First National Bank now stands, was rented.  
In 1889 Mr. D. T. Lawson and Mr. Clark Taylor donated the two lots on the corner of Bartlett and Fourth streets and a fine little church building was erected.  
For the first seven years of its existence the Methodist church of Medford was a part of a circuit, its ministers living in Ashland or Jacksonville. But the Medford church was growing very rapidly and in 1892 became a separate appointment.  
After a time the building became too small and an addition was built on the east side. But soon it was not sufficient and another addition was placed on the south to accommodate the growing Sunday school. Then it was not long until it became necessary to put up a tent and to use nearby residences for some of the classes.  
Finally, in 1923 a new site was purchased on West Main and Laurel streets and a new church building erected at a cost of \$100,000. The new building was completed and dedicated in 1924. But a very heavy debt was incurred and the depression which started in 1929 continued from that time on and proved too much for the congregation. In spite of heroic efforts of Dr. A. G. Bennett, who was then pastor, and a very loyal official board, in the spring of 1932 the property was sold under the sheriff's hammer.  
This proved to be a terrific blow to the congregation and there was some talk of abandoning their organization. But there was a band of faithful and loyal members who stood the crucial test.
