DEMONSTRATIONS OF CANNING SET BY HOME AGENT

To give homemakers of Jackson county the most up-to-the-minute assistance in preserving fruits, vegetables, meat and fish for winter use, a series of district canning demonstrations will be given this week by Mabel C. Mack, county home demonstration agent, assisted by Grace Smith, home adviser of the local rural rehabilitation staff.

Demonstrations will include the canning of fruits by water bath, open kettle or pressure cooker method; the canning of vegetables, meat and fish by pressure cooker, and canning in glass or tin. Many homemakers of Jackson county who have purchased new pressure cookers and tin can sealers during the past year will be interested in the instructions of the successful use of this equipment in canning. The use of the pressure cooker is emphasized for greater safety in canning non-acid foods.

The new canning bulletin on Home Food Preservation, a revised edition of Extension Bulletin No. 430 which has been prepared by Oregon State college specialists will be ready for distribution at the meetings, or may be obtained at the extension office, courthouse. It contains directions and time tables for canning fruits, vegetables, meat and fish, storing of vegetables, preservation of vegetables by salting and corning beef.

The canning demonstrations which will start at 1:30 are scheduled as follows: July 16, Rogue River, community hall; July 17, Eagle Point, schoolhouse; July 18, Ashland, American Legion hall; July 19, Medford, courthouse auditorium.

The homemakers of Jackson county are invited to attend the neatest demonstration.

TAX FORECLOSURE DUE IN FEW DAYS

A decree of foreclosure in the delinquent tax proceedings for Jackson county will be filed within a couple of days, according to District Attorney George A. Coddling. This decree is now in course of preparation. Until the decree is formally filed, delinquent taxpayers may make full payments or under the ten per cent installment plan. Once the decree is formally filed the ten per cent installment is not operative.

Under the installment plan, taxpayers by paying ten per cent of their taxes are granted six months time in which to settle the balance. According to the tax collection department of the sheriff's office, only about 60 persons, have made installment payments.

According to Sheriff Syd I. Brown, between 500 and 600 names remain on the delinquent tax list, including that approximately half of the original list of 1162 names, have made payments, since last April.

The Dalles Radio Held Not Essential

WASHINGTON, July 15.—(AP)—Denial of the application of Carl C. Struble for construction of a radio station at The Dalles, Ore., was recommended today to the communications commission by its examiner, John P. Bramhall. The examiner, who conducted hearings on the application, reported that to grant it "would not serve public interest, convenience and necessity."

10 Miners Killed By Deep Explosion

DORTMUND, Germany, July 15.—(AP)—Ten miners were killed, 32 injured and an undetermined number trapped underground today when an explosion 2,400 feet below the surface set fire to the coal shaft in which they were working. The mine employs 1,400 miners. Half that number, 700, were working when the blast occurred.

Zimmerman Signs
 Among the signers of the petitions were Senator Peter Zimmerman, Byron G. Carney, Richard Neuberger, J. E. Bennett, Albert Slaughter, W. A. Patrick, Aaron Holts, Frederick Schmalz, Roy Hewitt, A. M. Church, W. L. Redmond and Kelley Loe.

More petitions asking for an investigation will be presented by Dan Kellaher, former state parole officer, Mrs. Pomerooy said. The governor told her it was unnecessary for them to go to all that trouble to request an investigation. He granted the public hearing to be held August 2.

Mrs. Ariel B. Pomerooy, of the Central Point district, according to reports, has been circulating petitions in this county for several months asking for a pardon for L. A. Banks, serving a life sentence in state prison, for the slaying of Constable George A. Prescott here March 16, 1933. Reports further say that the petitions were scantily signed in this county.

Banks, through his brother-in-law, Charles F. Moran of Cleveland, now deceased, made an effort to secure a pardon last December, which was denied by then governor, Julius L. Meier.

Since that time, a report has been in circulation without official credence, that a plot existed in state prison "to poison Banks." Failing health, and this "plot" are expected to be advanced as reasons for liberating the former local agitator. It also reported that the attorney general's office, will file a vigorous protest against any clemency to Banks, at the hearing now scheduled for August 2.

TWO MEN HELD IN MORALS CHARGES

Erna Johnson, 45, of the Valleyview district, charged with a statutory offense involving two small boys, was scheduled to be arraigned today. The district attorney's office reported: "Johnson has intimated he would enter a plea of guilty," say officials.

Johnson was arrested Friday night by Ashland police upon a complaint signed by the father of the two boys. The police say Johnson was attempting to hide when arrested, and to elude the officers by going to California.

Steps to commit Dan Gold, a middle-aged man, charged with a sordid offense involving his own daughter, to the state insane asylum have been taken by county authorities following a hearing last Saturday.
