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11,000 NAVY INCREASE GIVES OPPORTUNITY TO ENLIST, WIN PROMOTION

The following announcement regarding increase in navy man-power was made today by the recruiting sub-station here:

Congress has authorized an increase of 11,000 men in the enlisted strength of the navy during the fiscal year 1936. The navy will begin the year with 62,500 men and finish the year with 93,500. About 5000 of the increase will be required for the new modern vessels being constructed and the remainder will be distributed throughout the service to fill up the crews of vessels which have in the past several years been under-manned, operating with crews of approximately two-thirds the prescribed allowance of personnel.

"The 11,000 increase will be recruited, and the first in faced with the task of supplying the petty officers for the new construction in addition to their own attrition. This offers great opportunities for young men with initiative. Enlisted personnel is being encouraged to complete the training courses available for their chosen trade and otherwise qualify themselves for promotion. It is estimated there will be about 6000 advancements authorized each quarter.

"The monthly quotas of the Portland navy recruiting district has been greatly increased and still further increases are anticipated for the coming months. Enlistments of all unmarried men between the ages of 17 and 25 who can qualify are being accepted."

For the southern Oregon district, applications should be made at the U. S. Navy Recruiting Sub-station in Medford.

GORE PROPERTY GOES TO MORTGAGE HOLDER

At a sheriff's sale held on the front steps of the courthouse this morning at ten o'clock, the W. H. Gore property on the Jacksonville highway was sold to the California Joint Stock-Land Bank of San Francisco, upon two mortgages one for \$38,000, the other for \$37,100. The Joint Land-Stock bank was the holder of the mortgages, and the only bidder.

Under Oregon law, the Joint Stock-Land bank is entitled to immediate possession, with a year for redemption allowed.
