



### BELCASTRO WANTS CLEAN WRESTLING IN THURSDAYS GO

Pete Belcastro, holder of the belt for the junior heavyweight championship of the Pacific coast, will wrestle clean against Johnny Soos of Indiana when they meet in one-half of the double main event of Thursday night's wrestling program. It was announced today by the Italian drop-kicker himself.

Pete arrived in Medford yesterday from his gold mine, situated in the hills near Leelanau, where he has been working out for the past several days at the business end of a shovel. He displayed a pair of badly blistered hands and winced when anyone gave him a handshake, but declared that they would be in fine shape for his tussle tomorrow night, and would serve as proof that otherwise he is in the pink of condition.

"I wrestled clean all the way through the tournament down south," said Pete, "because I was afraid I'd get eliminated, but more than once I caught myself just in time to keep from giving one or two of 'em a smash on the chin. The last time I wrestled here I stayed clean to keep from putting myself out of commission so I couldn't enter the tournament."

"If Soos starts out nice, I'll cut out the dirty stuff, too," declared Belcastro. This points toward a session of fast, hard grappling such as Les Wolfe and Belcastro staged two weeks ago in one of the best matches ever seen here.

Wolfe will tangle in the other half of the double main event with Al Stecher of Canada, in a bout that promises grudge matchwork. In the 20-minute opener, Floyd Wolfgang of Medford and Johnny Goodman of Cincinnati will be seen in action.

Bill Bowerman, new Medford high school football coach, will referee the boxing card. Bowerman is best known as a former Medford high school and University of Oregon football star, but he was an outstanding amateur boxer at Oregon and will be able to take care of himself in the ring.

Two championship fights will be staged, along with six other great 3-C battles. The picked fighters of the Medford district will be here to compete on the all-district card.

### SCHMELING, LOUIS BATTLE 'IN BAG'

CHICAGO, July 17.—(AP)—Mike Jacobs, head of the 20th Century Sporting club of New York, received a cablegram from Joe Jacobs, manager of Max Schmeling, today assuring that the German ex-heavyweight champion would fight Joe Louis, Detroit's "Brown Bomber" in New York in September, as previously arranged.

As soon as it is agreed upon where a \$30,000 cash deposit shall be posted, the contracts will be signed. Jacobs cabled from Berlin. The head of the New York Boxing club declined to post the money in Germany.

Today's developments are the latest in the fight between the 30th Century Sporting Club and Madison Square Garden to obtain the services of the German.

### SAD SAM SEEKING BOUT WITH PETE

Sad Sam Leters, tall Texan whose famous rubber legs have made him one of the best-litof grapplers ever to appear in Medford, has returned to the northwest fully recovered from injuries that have kept him out of circulation for several months. He is after a return match with Pete Belcastro, Italian grappler, whose celebrated drop-kicks were responsible for putting Leters out of commission.

When Pete kicked Limber Sam during a hectic bout some time ago at Klamath Falls, the blow partially paralyzed Leters' left side, and he has been taking osteopathic treatment for the injury in the east, but is now back in shape after a period of gradually-increased workouts.

CHICAGO, July 17.—(AP)—Joe Louis went to work today on riding himself of six pounds picked up during the past three weeks, as he opened drills for his 10-round bout with King Levinsky August 7 at Comiskey park, home of the Chicago White Sox.

The other party to the affair, the Kingfish, was due in Chicago from Tonawanda, Wis., where he spent 10 days in preliminary conditioning maneuvers. Levinsky, down close to 200 pounds and ready to start boxing, planned to leave tonight for his outdoor camp at Round Lake, Ill.

The Detroit Negro, who has been "having his run" since hewing Primo Carnera down three weeks ago, reached Chicago yesterday and will remain here until a camp site is lined up.

Louis, weighing 203 pounds, about six more than he carried against Carnera, said he was eager to get to work.

### ROGUES NOSE OUT EVANS CREEK CCC 9-8 IN EXHIBITION

The Medford Rogues, continuing a record of unbroken victories in exhibition games, last night threw a monkey-wrench into the winning coogs of the Evans Creek CCC team, at the high school field, 9-8, on the splendid pitching of Les Wolfe, Texan wrestler, and Gus Arnie, infielder and chucker. The Rogues, trailing 5-8 in the last half of the ninth, rallied and chased in four runs to take the game. Cavelli came to bat in the ninth, and singled. Arnie followed Cavelli to the plate, and he singled, sending Cavelli to second. Welton popped out next, and Buck, leary of "Hoffard's" batting eye after the big manager had tripled to the score board in the right field inning before, walked him, filling the bases.

The loss was the first for the CCC team in over 20 starts, they having dumped the Klamath Red Sox, southern Oregon league winners, and the runner-up Grants Pass Merchants, as well as the strongest independent teams in southern Oregon.

The Rogues meet the Broadway Colored Clowns at the fairgrounds Sunday, and fans are beginning to wonder what will happen if the Texas, Wolfe, is sent in against the colored lads.
