### 50,000 DEATHS IN CHINA FLOOD AREA

SHANGHAI, July 17.—(UP)—Deaths from floods in the rich Yangtze and Yellow River valleys today passed 50,000. Government and private relief agencies mobilized all available resources to aid 1,000,000 homeless in 700 inundated cities and villages. Stricken villagers, their superstition dominating in time of dread disaster, resorted to "old customs" to appease the dragon gods of the rivers. Priests in countless temples called their followers to pray to Kuan Yin, the goddess of mercy. They promised not to eat meat, believing the floods were caused because the souls of slaughtered cattle returned to plague the hearts of men.

### BRITISH MAY LIFT BAN ON ARMS TO ETHIOPIA

(By the Associated Press.) Ethiopian preparations for war have entered a new phase with Emperor Haile Selassie called for a general mobilization of his troops and with British sources indicating that the shipment of arms from Great Britain to Ethiopia may be permitted. The League of Nations announced at Geneva its council probably will be called together about July 29 to consider the crisis confronting the relationship of the African empire and Italy.

### UTILITY LOBBYIST ORDERED EVIDENCE BURNED IS CLAIM

(Continued from Page One) Leslie Peyton, field representative of the utility holding administration for the southern and eastern Oregon, was the main speaker at last night's meeting of the Medford Active Club.

His subject was the housing administration, which he said was important because the idea of it all is to create something that the country has not already had. It is a recovery act to put savings into circulation.

Mr. Peyton stated that two types of loans are available under the housing administration: first, the modernization loan that can be used on any type of property, and second, loans for residences only, in urban districts or just outside.

The idea in forming the housing administration was principally to correct the present state of 1910's cars, a 1900 home, and a 1910 garden and conveniences. Mr. Peyton declared.

Mr. Peyton stated that the purpose of the loan system is to make the home more attractive and conditions more favorable, consequently promoting more satisfied family relations.

(Continued from Page One) The utility executives, said in a statement: "If subsequent evidence confirms the accusation that representatives of the utility holding company have sent out false telegrams opposing the public utilities bill, the committee of public utility executives condemn such action as dishonest just as strongly as any other group in the United States."

"It is acts like this committed by a small number of companies which have brought discredit upon the industry and which have made it necessary for us to come to Washington to defend ourselves against a bill seeking to destroy us."

The senate lobby investigators ordered Western Union officials to preserve all telegrams sent out in the last year.

On the other side of the capital, the house rules committee investigating utilities lobbying heard Representative Brewster (R., Me.) assert that he was ready to sacrifice his reputation, if necessary, for the Passamaquoddy tide harnessing act.

Denies Play Ball Edict. The house committee adjourned after hearing Thomas Corcoran, RFC attorney, deny that he said Brewster must "play ball" with him on the Passamaquoddy project.

Testimony by Roy T. Haines, a secretary to Brewster, that Dr. Harry Cory of the public works administration told him that "nothing more will be doing on 'quoddy' until the holding company bill is out of the way" and that Brewster had better come back from Maine because "he is holding up 'quoddy'" was described by Cory as "absurd."

Questioned at his office by reporters, he said it was Haines who "did the talking."

"I didn't know anything about the holding company bill," Cory said. "Haines told me the Passamaquoddy project would be held up until Governor Brewster got back. He did not tell me why."

### Truck Derails Liberty Limited

UPPER SANDUSKY, Ohio, July 17.—(AP)—Ten persons were injured when the Liberty Limited of the Pennsylvania railroad hit a truck, derailed and tore up track for three blocks here early today.

Three of the injured were reported to be in a serious condition. The locomotive sheared off the platform of a freight station and wrecked several freight cars before it overturned.

### SOUTHWEST HEAT KILLS THREE MORE

LOS ANGELES, July 17.—(AP)—The mercury, after jolting around for several days in the upper ranges for the thermometer, turned slightly downward today throughout the southwest, but three deaths were added to the toll of the heat wave, bringing the three day total to 11.

E. S. Ormsby collapsed and died while at work on an oil lease near Maricopa, Calif., Cliff Davis, 50, enroute with his family from Hollister, Calif., to Sardinia, Miss., was overcome at Salome, Ariz., and succumbed.

George Gump, a Gila Bend, Ariz., ranch hand, died of the illness induced by the terrific heat.

Temperatures above the 100-degree mark were still common, but the local weather tomorrow would probably be slightly cooler.

Returns from 1,852 of the state's 2,242 precincts showed for Monday's election a total of 63,341 votes in favor of the law, 58,757 against it.
