



COIN WILL DECIDE FINALISTS ON MAT CARD AT ARMORY

Stecher Determined to Muss Wolfe Up — Belcastro Promises to 'Go Clean' — Warren Faces Wolfgang

At the flip of a coin at the Armory tonight it will be decided whether Les Wolfe and Al Stecher, a pair of big-time grapplers, or Pete Belcastro and Johnny Soos, another pair of equally talented grunts and gron artists, have the honor of winding up a double main event that promises approximately two hours of exciting wrestling, whichever way the coin falls.

If it falls in favor of the Stecher-Wolfe lineup, fans will see a climax that will probably bring forth the fireworks, as this match has developed into a grudge affair.

Stecher, who admits that he was suspended from mat appearances at San Francisco recently because of undue roughness, has been boasting to his Medford friends that he is going to smother Wolfe's handsome face all over the mat, "because I don't like good-looking guys."

"Fans around here have never seen real rough stuff," declared Stecher, who has demonstrated here that he is no sooty, although he has not yet shown any great amount of temper while in Medford. He proved that he has a reputation for roughness by exhibiting newspaper clippings that show he has been nearly mobbed on several occasions.

Handsome Les, one of Medford's prime favorites, says he is "burned up" over Stecher's cockiness and although he admits that the Canadian is an experienced mainman, is confident of pinning him.

If the coin falls in favor of the Belcastro-Soos match, the headline book will probably see speedy, scientific grappling, punctuated by the Italian's most formidable weapon, the double drop-kick.

Pete says he is going to wrestle clean—that is if Soos does the same. In his last bout here it was proved that the colorful drop-kicker is one of the most talented scientific wrestlers ever brought to Medford.

When word was received here today that Johnny Goodman of Cincinnati had been injured and is unable to appear, Promoter Lillard scored a coup by signing Roland Warren, speedy Copco engineer, to meet Floyd Wolfgang in the 20-minute opening engagement.

The promoter said this morning that ticket sales indicate a full house.

RED-STRIPED SOCKS GIVE LUCK TO GIRL SWIM STARS

NEW YORK, July 18.—(AP)—Those supple-haired swimmer sisters of Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., who have won 250 swimming trophies, attribute it all to their red-striped socks.

"We've believed in them since I won my first national title from Eleanor Holm," said the oldest sister, crop-haired Katherine, 18, who isn't sure how many records she holds.

"I had been wearing striped red socks before that meet," she said. "The three sisters—a family match for the swimming Spence brothers—brought their gala socks along when they came to compete this week in the women's A. A. U. title meet at Manhattan beach."

"They all talked at once. 'It's fun swimming in sisters,'" said Evelyn, 16, who hopes to win the 800-meter free style relay with Katherine. They placed third last year.

"We can all go around together. 'We're friends on land, but enemies in the water,'" offered 14-year-old Dorothy. "We try to beat each other's records."

"Boy, you should see Evelyn and me fight breast stroke!" Dorothy and Katherine yearn to win the medley relay this week for the second time in succession.

"My great ambition," said Katherine, "is to win first place in the Olympics and take my sisters with me."

Did they plan to teach swimming? "Goodness, no," exclaimed Katherine. "We couldn't teach a dog to swim."

"I can't even remember when I learned—I learned so long ago. I want to be a tourmaline."

"I want to be a dress model," said Evelyn, whose hair boasted a blue ribbon.

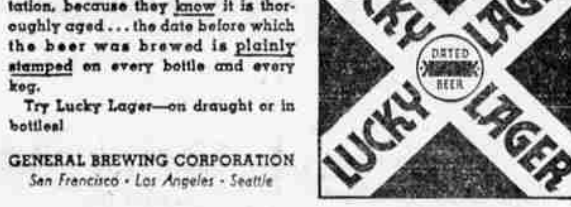
