

BANKS CONSPIRACY CHARGE IS 'BOSH' DECLARES MOODY

visiting and corresponding with him, though she lives but five blocks from the penitentiary.

"The attitude of the Bellview Grange in denouncing members of the state Grange executive committee for actively executing clemency for Banks, is an index to the respect that the Grange as a body has for law and order," and the constituted courts," Assistant Attorney-General Moody declared today. "I am deeply grateful for that expression coming from Jackson county where all the facts are known."

"It seems apparent," continued Moody, "the present application for a pardon for Banks, is being pressed by many who are unacquainted with the facts, and are attempting to make an issue for political purposes to embarrass Governor Martin."

Many Oppose Clemency

Moody also stated that "many civic organizations and lodges were adopting resolutions against clemency and that a great many letters from prominent citizens, as well as numerous petitions, were being forwarded to the governor and that before August 2nd, the day appointed for the hearing, a deluge of these protests would be in the hands of the governor."

"Just before Governor Meier retired from the governor's office, he gave a very full, extended and complete hearing to the Banks case on Banks' petition for a pardon and Governor Meier refused to either grant a pardon or to extend any executive clemency."

"The people here are making these protests only because the record made in the former petition for a pardon was destroyed in the fire of the capital building and they have every confidence in their governor but only wish to support him in his splendid stand for law enforcement and in supporting the decisions of our courts."

Continuing, the Assistant Attorney General Moody said:

"Banks was charged with the killing of Officer George A. Prescott, one of the best known and best loved peace officers in Jackson county, Prescott, in the discharge of his

BAR ASSOCIATION VOTES HANDS OFF NEW DEAL POLICY

LOS ANGELES, July 19.—(AP)—A "hands off" policy regarding President Roosevelt's New Deal was adopted by the American Bar association at its annual convention here with the probable election of William L. Ransom of New York City as president.

James M. Beck of Washington was regarded as a "dark horse" candidate. A decision to defer until November, at least, any expression of the New Deal was reached yesterday when the association approved without comment the action of its executive committee suggesting the postponement of final consideration of the report of a special committee named to determine the "effects of the New Deal on the rights and liberties of the American citizen."

The special committee, named last year, included a number of legal notables, including Owen D. Young of New York City; George W. Pepper of Philadelphia; W. D. Mitchell, former United States Attorney General; J. D. Clark of Laramie, Wyo.; C. P. Taff, II; George L. Burt of Charleston, S. C.; and C. E. Martin of Martinsburg, W. Va.

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\$10,000 OFFERED FOR AID TO PILOTS IN FOG

BOSTON — (UP)—Ten thousand dollars to the scientist who perfects a device that will eliminate the hazards of flying in fog.

That's the offer of Godfrey Cabot, vice-president of the Federation aeronautique internationale. Cabot's offer specifies that the device must be one that will enable a pilot—Independent of any radio signal or assistance from ground personnel or equipment—to land his plane safely through 100 feet of fog in any part of the world.
