HUGE STILL, MASH AND TRIO NABBED
PORTLAND, July 20.—(AP)—Federal agents today put a crimp in Oregon's illicit liquor business. Two men were arrested. Two automobiles were seized and a 275-gallon still valued at \$2500 was found when officers raided a site southeast of Portland. Two thousand gallons of mash also was found.
Those arrested gave their names as Clarence Neal and George Fritch. Each posted \$2500 bail. Preliminary hearing was set for July 25.

PLAN PROTECTION TRUCK OPERATORS
In an effort to protect authorized truck operators, Edward A. Landis, superintendent of transportation and Herbert H. Haiser, chief of field supervision and enforcement, arrived Friday from Salem. The officials declared that while a farmer is entitled to haul his own produce to market and may also haul 25 loads of unlimited weight during a year for an immediate neighbor, but not more than five per month, or may haul not over 700 pounds at any time, it is the intent of the law to limit commercial hauling to those who have paid for state permits and otherwise complied with requirements necessary in providing revenue and responsibility in road upkeep.
Soon after the first of August there will be a state man stationed here to give information and issue authority for hauling for compensation. Truck operators will be able to contact the transportation official through the state police.

LINCOLN, Neb., July 20.—(AP)—Aden Sheriff of Norfolk, who recently was unsuccessful in an attempt to organize a third political party, today said Will Rogers, the humorist, will be drafted as another organization candidate at another organization meeting in Norfolk, August 21.
