State Press Comments Upon Freedom Move for Banks

HONEST PETE "IN DUTCH" In the demand of a Jackson county Grange for the resignation of Peter Zimmerman and Alfred Slaughter from the executive board of the state Grange there is a warning against "liberalism run amuck."

Many of those identified with the movement have gained prominence largely through attempts to stir up various kinds of political disturbances in Oregon, and this fact makes it appear that they are perhaps more interested in more disturbance than in correcting any injustice that may have been done to Banks.

It is natural that the first revolt should come in Jackson county where the memories of the Banks feud are still acute, but the uprising against the tactics of the national Grange is likely to become general over the state.

COAST BUSINESS AHEAD LAST YEAR; BUILDING GAINS. SAN FRANCISCO, July 20.—(AP)—West coast business trends were irregular with the aggregate ahead of 1934.

Hot summer weather wilted consumer resistance last week and pushed retail demand forward in most sections of the nation.

Contrary to general expectations, industrial activity was noted maintained in some of the key production centers of the country, but there was no unprecedented collapse in the rate of operations in major lines.

Steel makers operated their plants at 30 per cent of capacity, 4.5 per cent points higher than the previous week, and analysts saw no indications of the usual sharp mid-summer slump for that heavy industry.

It was stated in some quarters that steel held its position without particular benefit of the motor industry which in the past few months has supplied a large portion of the demand.

WILEY POST SET FOR MOSCOW HOP VIA NORTH POLE. SAN FRANCISCO, July 20.—(AP)—An over-the-polar-region air route between the United States and Russia, foreseen here as a possible shortcut to Europe and Asia, was aviation's newest pioneering project today.

Russia's flyers were ready at Moscow for a takeoff on a proposed non-stop flight over the North Pole to Oakland, Cal., a distance of 6000 miles.

The veteran American aviator, Wiley Post, planned to skim away from Los Angeles Monday, accompanied by his wife, on an air trip over the edge of the polar region between Siberia and probably on to Moscow.

Only favorable weather was anticipated by the Russian flyers, M. G. Galkovitch, consul general for the U. S. S. R. here, said, the plans called for a takeoff by July 25.

The purpose of the flight, the consulate announced, was to survey the shortest possible air route between Russia and the United States.

Consulate officials said they were unable to comment on the commercial possibilities of the proposed route but it was noted that the flight was projected on the heels of the new trade agreement between the United States and the U. S. S. R.

The Canadian government today granted permission for the Soviet plane to fly over Canadian territory and use of the Oakland airport was authorized yesterday by Mayor William H. McCracken of that city.

TRAPEZIST'S WIFE TELLS OF RIVAL

SAN FRANCISCO, July 20.—(AP)—One handsome young man on a flying trapeze, as his wife described him, was divorced here today because he had too many "lady admirers."

Mrs. Tania Markovskaya, the accomplished wife, said she fell in love with Eugene Markovskoy, circus aerialist, when she saw his trapeze-performing photograph on a billboard.

She went to the circus, saw him swing through the air with ease and grace; met and married him, Mrs. Markovskoy added.

"But I wasn't the only one in his life," she told the court. "When I came home one night from a trip, I found another woman had climbed through the window to be with him."

Mrs. Markovskoy said Markovskoy was not "trapezing" just at present, but was at a river resort in California "paying attention to another woman."
