COAST 'DU BARRY' HELD MUTILATOR ON STAND MONDAY

PORTLAND, July 27.—(AP)—The self-styled "Count Du Barry" of Gold Beach and Seattle will have an opportunity next Monday to tell the court his side of the story in the civil action brought by an insurance company which insists he deliberately shot away both hands that he might collect on an insurance policy. The defendant in the action, George H. Du Barry, who claims to have descended from French nobility and who refers to himself as "Count," lost both hands in July, 1933, at Gold Beach, when a shotgun exploded. The Aetna Life Insurance company, after having made several payments for the disability, is unable to cancel a \$12,500 policy. Two former employers of Du Barry had testified that he had offered them sums of money if they would aid in the mutilation of his hands so he could collect on the insurance. W. R. Harner, one of the ex-employees, testified, also, that Du Barry once suggested driving his automobile into the sea and then disappearing so his wife could collect on the policy. The testimony of another of these insurance company witnesses, W. J. Himerick of Gold Beach, was shaken in cross-examination when a Seattle hotel manager testified he had seen Himerick and Du Barry conversing in the lobby last December. Himerick and Du Barry had never talked to Du Barry after the loss of his hands. The defense had asked Himerick whether he had not met Du Barry and demanded \$5000 from him. Du Barry had insisted his ex-employees were trying to "frame" him because he could not pay their back salaries. The case is expected to be concluded early next week.

LANDING MISHAP FATAL TO FOUR

MILWAUKEE, July 27.—(AP)—Four men were killed today when their airplane fell from a height of 400 feet as the pilot, R. M. Henschel, of Winnetka, Ill., attempted a downwind landing at Curtiss Wright airport here. Henschel and his three companions all of Chicago were killed instantly. Witnesses said Henschel attempted to land with the wind and lost speed when still 400 feet above the ground. The ship nosed down and plunged earthward. Apparently the pilot cut the ignition before the ship struck. The plane did not catch fire.

SOVIET SEEKING RECORD GAIN IN RATE OF BIRTHS

Communist Paper's Stand Linked With Preparedness Program — Sharp Break With Past Policy

Baird (United Press Staff Correspondent) MOSCOW — (UP)—A campaign for an increase in the population of the Soviet Union, reminiscent of that conducted in recent years in Germany and Italy, was started today by Pravda, the chief organ of the Communist party. Recalling that since the revolution, the population of the Soviet Union had increased by 25,000,000, Pravda declared: "We are sincerely happy at this increase. Our tempo must break all records in this field, too."

Further on the lead editorial continued: "The greater our birth-rate, the quicker we will be able to put our potential wealth to the service of the people who have cast off age-old slavery to capitalist land-owners and slavers." Capitalistic Countries Attacked The appeal for an increase in the Soviet population was combined with a bitter attack on conditions in so-called capitalistic countries, where Pravda maintained the "holly national instinct" was being suppressed because of "capitalistic obstacles." Pravda's outspoken editorial is highly interesting in connection with the recent campaign here to abolish or at least strictly control abortions. For many years the Soviet Union has been regarded by the outside world as extremely liberal regarding the freedom of the individual to practice birth control. Since the revolution until recently the state has maintained clinics where operations were possible for the payment of an insignificant fee, while birth-control literature was freely circulated. Inasmuch as Pravda always sounds the dominant note in forecasts of state and Communist party policies, it is reasonable to suppose this trend of thought is rapidly approaching an end.

Military Preparedness Seen No explanation for this sharp break with past policy was given, but undoubtedly it is not entirely unconnected with the policy of military preparedness for which throughout history rulers have considered a high birth-rate necessary. The appeal for an increase in the Soviet population was combined with a dark picture of the condition of women in capitalistic countries. After recalling the falling birth-rate in France and England, Pravda continued: "Capitalism has entered a blind alley. To continue its existence it daily destroys thousands and thousands of human lives. Armed conflicts, wars, famines, shooting of revolutionary workers, hunger and poverty of hundreds of millions, prostrations and abortions which maim women—such is the other side of capitalistic civilization."

Stalin is Quoted "In our country the woman-mother is the most honored person. In the increase of the population of our country, we see the source of an increase of wealth of the country and of all successive capitals (quoting Stalin) 'of all values because in the world the most valuable, the most important, are people.'"

"The law is a strong protector of mother and child. Capitalistic barbarity takes away from woman what is dearest to her—her right to maternity."
