CUBS WIN TWICE, CUT GIANTS' LEAD TO SINGLE GAME

CHICAGO, July 27. — (AP) — The Cubs ran roughshod over the Cincinnati Reds today to win both games of a doubleheader, 9 to 8 and 12 to 1 and to reduce the New York Giants' lead to a single game.

The twin triumph made it eight in a row for the Cubs and 21 out of their last 24 games and put them 2 1/2 games in front of the third place St. Louis Cardinals. Both the Giants and Cardinals lost today.

Chicago had to come from behind to take the opener after Roy Henshaw had been belted out in two innings.

The second game was just a breeze for Lon Warneke, who gave only five hits for his 12th victory of the season.

CLEVELAND, July 27. — (AP) — Dr. W. Montague Cobb, of Howard and Western Reserve universities, said today an examination of Jesse Owens, Ohio State University track star, reveals that industry, training, incentive and outstanding courage rather than physical characteristics are responsible for the young negro sprinter's accomplishments.

Dr. Cobb said a detailed physical examination of Owens has been made in the first of a number of attempts by science to determine why runners are so speedy.

SCHMELING WANTS TOO MUCH COIN TO MEET LOUIS, BAER

NEW YORK, July 27. — (AP) — Max Schmeling, the temperamental Teuton, broke his silence today and talked himself right out of the American heavyweight picture.

He demanded such a fancy figure to come to New York to fight either Max Baer or the sensational Joe Louis, that Jimmy Johnston and Mike Jacobs, rival metropolitan promoters, threw up their hands and said they guessed they'd have to try to struggle along without the German financier.

All Herr Schmeling wanted was: A flat guarantee of \$150,000 (free of taxes) deposited in an Amsterdam bank in advance of the fight; 35 per cent of the gate (also free of taxes) and \$5,000 for training expenses.

Joe Jacobs, Max's manager, put on the hot spot by the German's dawdling around, was agast when he read his warrior's cable.

"I am convinced he's been giving us all the old run around, including me, who put him in the champion's ship," he said. "He's just been stalling around."

The 20th Century club said it would go right ahead with plans to feature the Detroit "Brown Bomber" in a big show here in September and hinted it might seek Max Baer as Louis' opponent.

LILLARD ANGLES FOR SAM-PETE GO

Promoter Mack Lillard stated yesterday that he had not yet been able to line up a wrestling card for next Thursday night, but he is so sure of getting good talent that he has authorized a crew to install 100 new ring-side seats at the Armory.

The present stands will be moved back allowing room for a new row of ring-side chairs which will make the total six instead of five rows. Old seats that have become broken will also be repaired, the promoter announced.

Lillard is trying to match Pete Bracato and Sad Sam Letters, which would be a grudge match prominently plenty of fireworks, as Pete recently gave Letters a drop-kick that put the tall Texan entirely out of commission for some time.

CHICAGO, July 27. — (AP) — They haven't found an anchor heavy enough yet to sink the old globe trotter, Discovery.

In the \$10,000 added Arlington handicap today they loaded him down with the crushing impost of 135 pounds, but he carried it like a champion to soundly whip his field and smash the track record for the mile and a quarter, hung up by Omaha just a week ago.

The sensational four-year-old, owned by Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt, of New York, registered his sixth successive stake victory to become the handicapped champion of the American turf for 1935.

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CITY LIABLE FOR DEATHS IN RING

SALEM, Ore., July 27. — (AP) — Attorney General L. H. Van Winkle today rendered an opinion holding that municipalities and boxing commissions were liable for the injury or death of contestants in boxing exhibitions when it is proved the municipalities or commissions are negligent.

The opinion, which also held that parents of minors have no authority to release any claim in consenting to their children's participation, was asked by the state boxing and wrestling commission.

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AMERICAN SQUAD LOSE FIRST SETS DAVIS CUP PLAY

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 27. — (AP) — There was something hauntingly familiar about the atmosphere around Wimbledon's cloistered courts tonight as America's Davis Cup tennis players, beaten in the two opening singles matches of the challenge round, tried to assume cheery fronts as they prepared to spend a quiet week-end in the country.

The official count was two to none for England, both Wilmer Allison of Austin, Tex., and 20-year-old Don Budge of Oakland, Calif., losing to H. W. (Bunny) Austin and Fred J. Perry, respectively. The hardest blow of all was the short-panted Austin's triumph, for it was hopefully figured he would be the victim of two American victories. Instead, he took the measure of Allison in five sets, 6-2, 2-6, 4-6, 6-4, 7-5, while Budge captured the fancy of the capacity crowd of more than 18,000 by extending the sparkling Perry to four sets before bowing, 6-0, 6-6, 6-3, 6-4.

As matters stood the United States was in exactly the same spot it occupied a year ago, both in the matter of defeats at the end of the first day and in prospects for the next three matches. Allison's failure to "take" Austin sent America's hopes of recapturing the coveted cup, lost since 1927, down around the zero point.

Layden jumped from third place to first with 137.173 points, while Dr. Clarence W. Spears of Wisconsin, moved up from fourth to second with 136.415. Charles Bachman of Michigan state, fifth yesterday, had 136.329 for third position.

Bernie Bierman of Minnesota, yesterday's leader, was fourth with 135.775, and Frank Thomas of Alabama, second yesterday, was fifth at 135.457. Bo McMillin of Indiana, remained sixth with a 126.629 total.
