House in Favor of Gift Exemption — WASHINGTON, July 31.—(AP)—Over President Roosevelt's publicly expressed objections, house ways and means committee Democrats were disclosed today to have agreed to let corporations deduct charitable gifts from their incomes.

Chairman Doughton (D., N. C.) called the full committee to meet tomorrow to approve an amendment which will be offered to the tax bill Friday or Saturday.

As agreed to by the Democrats, corporation gifts and contributions which could be exempted from taxation would be limited to 5 per cent of the corporation's net income.

ONTARIO EDITOR FACES CONTEMPT — ONTARIO, Ore., July 31.—(AP)—George K. Aiken, editor and publisher of the Weekly Ontario Argus, was yesterday cited to appear in court here August 16 on contempt proceedings after Circuit Judge Charles W. Ellis had ruled that an editorial in the paper constituted improper comment on a court case.

Judge Ellis held that an editorial which appeared following the sentence and parole of a prisoner, contained statements which were not correct and that the editorial constituted comment upon a pending case.

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ETHIOPIA SPURNS MANDATE PROFFER, ITALY OBDDURATE

ADDIS ABABA, July 31.—(AP)—The Ethiopian foreign office announced today that the nation would reject any proposal for an international League of Nations mandate over Ethiopia.

The foreign office issued a communique stating that no such proposal had been made to the imperial government and that, furthermore, if any were received it would be turned down.

"No amount of prosperity under foreign domination," declared the foreign office, "would compensate for the loss of independence."

GENEVA, July 31.—(AP)—Baron Pompeo Adelt, Premier Mussolini's representative in the League of Nations, flatly told the league council today that Italy would not discuss anything at this time except the arbitration question in its dispute with Ethiopia.

The Italian representative declared he could not participate in any discussion which included other matters than the subject of arbitration.

FINLEY INSISTS WILD FOWL HURT

PORTLAND, July 31.—(AP)—Reiteration of the charges that the United States reclamation project in Klamath county pays no heed to water-fowl and that engineers have been both careless and destructive of wild life resources was made by William L. Finley, Portland naturalist, late yesterday.

His remarks were aimed principally at E. E. Hayden, superintendent of the Klamath reclamation project. Hayden recently answered charges by Finley, and said he favored development of land habitable by both man and bird.

Finley recently returned from Washington, where he conferred with Secretary of the Interior Ickes and J. N. Darling, chief of the biological survey.

NORTHWEST WORKS CHAIRMAN PICKED

WASHINGTON, July 31.—(AP)—Appointment of Dr. T. J. D. Shanley of Butte, Mont., as chairman of a regional works progress administration advisory board for the western states was announced late yesterday by Harry L. Hopkins, works progress administrator.

The board will consist of from three to five members to be announced later. Oregon will be under the board which will act as observer of the works progress administration's operations and has been asked to give the administration the benefit of unbiased, competent advice from an outside point of view.

Board members will receive \$25 a day when actually on governmental business. Other regional boards will be appointed later.

SALEM, July 31.—(AP)—T. S. Farrell of Lakewood today was appointed state bonus commission attorney of Lake county to succeed L. F. Conn, who has resigned.

ICKES OPENS AIR TOUR TO ENLIST MORE PWA WORK

WASHINGTON, July 31.—(AP)—Secretary Ickes borrowed a navy plane today and sent out five of his most trusted lieutenants in a final attempt to sell the country on more PWA projects.

Headed by Col. Horatio B. Hackett, assistant PWA administrator, and former West Point football star, the party scheduled Columbus, Ohio, as its first stop enroute to the west coast and back via the Northwest.

Cities to be visited by the PWA officials during their flight included: August 5: San Francisco, August 6: Portland, Oregon, August 7: Fly over Bonneville dam, arrive Seattle, Wash., August 8: Spokane, Wash., August 13: Report to Ickes.

MINNEAPOLIS, July 31.—(AP)—Possibility that Donie Bush, manager of Minneapolis' American Association baseball team, might succeed Walter Johnson as pilot of the Cleveland Indians in the American league, was strengthened today following conversations between Bush and Billy Evans, general manager of the major league club.

COLLAPSE POLISH HOUSE KILLS 15 SEEPERS, HURTS 16

WARSAW, July 31.—(AP)—About 15 persons were killed and 16 injured today when an old house, the birthplace of Marie Curie, co-discoverer of radium, collapsed.

Exact figures of the number of casualties were withheld as the rescue work continued.

The four-story house collapsed without warning upon the sleeping inmates at 5 A.M. Its occupants were estimated to number 36 but how many were within it at the time of the collapse was not immediately determined.

Four bodies were brought out promptly, and at least ten persons occupying the lower floors of the house were believed to have been buried in the debris.

Two women were located alive but could not be reached as the masonry continued to fall.

SUPER-SPEED ARMY PLANE MISSING

LOS ANGELES, July 31.—(AP)—Two ominous circles of fresh oil on the ocean off the Palos Verdes hills today provided the only tangible clue to a super-speed army pursuit plane that disappeared yesterday afternoon on a test flight from the municipal airport.

The oil spots heightened the fears of Lt. William VanDusen, one of the leaders of an extensive aerial search, that the low-winged army craft had plunged into the sea, carrying Lieut. Arthur H. Skaer, Jr., to death.

The pursuit plane, built by the Northrup corporation, had a top speed of 325 miles an hour, making it possibly the fastest military aircraft in the world. Considerable secrecy shrouded its development and testing.
