

Duck Hunting Season Limited to 30 Days, by New Federal Order

OCT. 21 TO NOV. 19, TEN BIRDS IN DAY RULE FOR OREGON

Approved Regulations to Save Wild Fowl and Only Alternative for Closed Season.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Outlining the "most rigid regulations in the history of American wild-fowl hunting," J. M. "Dink" Darling, chief of the biological survey, today said the nation's duck hunters will have 30 days of shooting this fall.

Darling said the regulations had been approved by President Roosevelt and that he expected them to save 50 per cent of the increase in ducks this year.

Shooting over baited water or land will be prohibited.

No live decoys can be used at any place.

Zoning of states by seasons will be eliminated and the nation will be divided into two zones, northern and southern.

Shooting will be permitted only between 7 a. m. and 4 p. m.

Possession of more than one day's bag limit, which was reduced from 12 to 10, will be illegal.

A three-shell limit on auto-loading and repeating shotguns will become effective.

The season will open in northern states October 21 and close November 19.

In southern states it will be from November 20 to December 19.

States in the northern zone include: North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, Utah, Washington, Oregon and Nevada.

States in the southern zone include: Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California.

In Alaska, west of the 141st meridian, the season will be open September 1 and close September 30. In the rest of the territory the season will be September 20 to October 19.

Darling said the restrictions were the only alternative to a closed season.

"We've killed more ducks than we have hatched every year for the last 25 years," he declared.

He estimated 24,000,000 ducks will fly south this fall and 12,000,000 will be killed by hunting and "natural causes."

Darling said, he figured 9,000,000 were killed by hunters last year and that the kill this year would be from 8,000,000 to 6,000,000.

Bag limits on geese and brant will remain at four, but one hunter may have in his possession only one day's kill compared to two days' kill permitted last year.

Bag and possession limits on other species were outlined, as follows: Coot, 15; jackknipe, 15; sora, 25; mallard, 25; woodcock, 15; woodcock, 4; mourning dove, 20; hand-tailed pigeon, 10.

New season on mourning doves provide for shooting in northern states from September 1 to December 15, and in southern states from October 1 to January 15.

The northern zone for dove-hunting includes: Nebraska, Kansas, Colorado, Idaho, Utah, Oregon and Nevada.

The southern dove-hunting zone: Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California.

Hand-tailed pigeons may be hunted in California from December 1 to October 15; in Arizona and Oregon, October 15 to October 30; in New Mexico, October 1 to October 15; and in Washington, September 15 to September 30.

FUCHS QUITS AS OWNER OF BRAVES; BAMBINO NO HELP

BOSTON, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Emil Fuchs, colorful president of the Boston Braves for the past 10 years, to silent and wealthy Bill McKeehin, to silent and taciturn Bill McKeehin, his manager since 1920.

Fuchs had until today to regain control of the club by obtaining 8500 shares of stock from Charles P. Adams, his vice-president. He announced yesterday that he was unable to do so and bowed to Adams' "pay up or get out by August 15" ultimatum.

The switch that made McKeehin temporary president is an ironical one. Five months ago, when Fuchs coached Babe Ruth to Boston, McKeehin, who works under a verbal agreement, was destined to be ousted by the famous home-run slugger, who made no secret of his managerial ambitions.

Fuchs hoped that the Babe's presence would solve his financial problems, but they were ill-matched. The blow-off came several weeks ago when they exchanged hard names and Ruth retorted.

McKeehin's pro tem promotion, however, probably will be of short duration. He will finish the season as manager. Next year, if Adams fails to find a purchaser, Bob Quinn, who sold the Red Sox to Tom Yawkey, probably will be lured from Brooklyn to take over the general management of the Braves. McKeehin will remain under him as team manager.

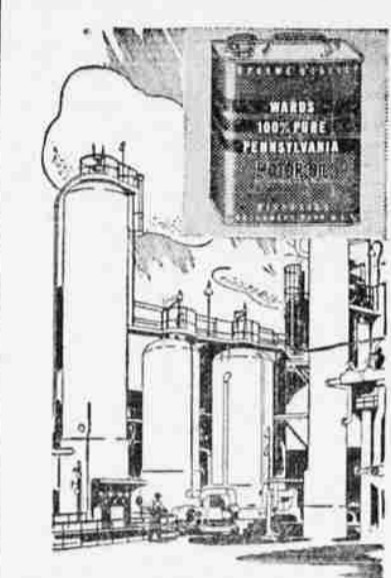

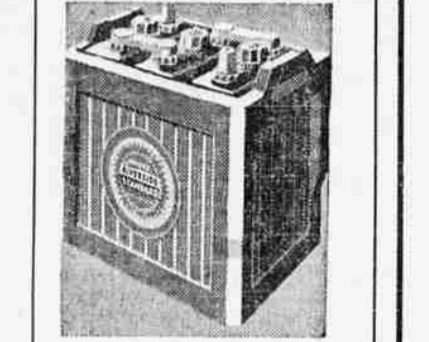

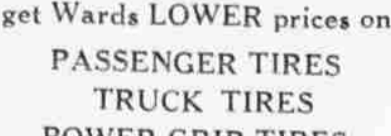
