COLUMBIA RIVER FISHERMEN AWAIT WALKOUT ORDERS

ASTORIA, Ore., Aug. 1.—(UP)—A strike today appeared almost certain to tie up the Columbia river salmon fishing industry after 6 o'clock tonight and three 5,000 fishermen and cannery workers out of employment. An impasse prevailed and the Columbia River Fishermen's Protective union, which called the walkout, will not meet until Saturday to consider the next move. Packers have offered six cents a pound for salmon until August 15. The union, declaring the pack elsewhere is light, demanded eight cents until August 15 and six cents thereafter until the end of the season. Packers contended that market conditions and quality of the fish do not justify such a price. A one-day strike was called last August in a similar dispute over last season's fish.

FLETCHER FLAYS NEW DEAL; NOW SEEK SCAPEGOAT

WASHINGTON (UP)—The new deal is seeking "to pervert or subvert the constitution." Chairman Henry Fletcher of the republican national committee charged tonight. In a speech on "fundamental issues in the making," Fletcher said President Roosevelt's administration is looking for a scapegoat because its policies are failing and "thinks it has found it in the constitution." "This covert, but soon to be open, attack on our basic law is even more dangerous and menacing than the crazy patchwork of laws and decrees which has gone by the name of the new deal," Fletcher said. Recalling claims after the last election that the new deal had been submitted to the people and approved, Fletcher said it evoked more grandiose plans for the "more abundant life." "The president demanded, and after some squabbling over details, received from congress the staggering sum of \$4,800,000,000 to spend as he pleased. Merrily the new deal was rolling along in blissful disregard of the laws of economics, finance and the basic law of the land. The new dealers and their horde of payroll parasites and hangers-on were sitting pretty." "Into this situation fell the unanimous decision of the United States Supreme court declaring the NIRA unconstitutional and undermining the whole new deal structure. The sensible people of the nation breathed a sigh of relief. Their feeling of security, however, was destined to be short-lived." "The president's historic press conference of May 31 and the political developments since indicate the political trend. Many of the new deal laws and pending bills, which the president has ordered congress to pass whether they like it or not, still have to undergo the final test of constitutionality. The nearly uniform decisions of the lower courts forecast the ultimate result." "The Roosevelt administration realizes this. So what? The constitutional barriers to 'planned economy' are to be abandoned. Why? Because they stand in the way of a centralized, socialistic state, governed without restraint or limit by a president and a subservient congress." Fletcher warned that if the safeguards of the constitution are removed, congress cannot help being subservient to the executive. "The president's purpose," he continued, "seems clear from the letter he wrote to Representative Hill, chairman of the house sub-committee in charge of the Guffey bill, in which he said: 'I hope your committee will not permit doubts as to constitutionality, however reasonable, to block the suggested legislation.'" Fletcher said the republican party stood ready to meet the challenge.
