

MUSSOLINI BALKS AT SECTIONS OF SETTLEMENT PLAN

GENEVA, Aug. 2. — (AP) — Premier Mussolini today failed to accept in its entirety the Italo-Ethiopian settlement formula prepared last night by statesmen of Great Britain, France and Italy, and further telephone conversations with Il Duce appeared necessary.

Mussolini's reply to the suggestion was communicated to Premier Laval of France, one of those who had prepared the formula, by Baron Pompeo Aloisi of Italy, another who had taken part in its preparation.

Despite the fact that Mussolini had balked at accepting the suggestions for a peaceful solution of the conflict with Ethiopia in their entirety, French delegates said they were optimistic, believing the outstanding points would be cleared up rapidly.

Laval said the League of Nations council definitely would meet today if the complete accord of all parties, including the Ethiopians, is reached, the session will be public to adopt a formal resolution. If no agreement is achieved, a private session is to be held to put the council in touch with the situation.

SHEEPMAN PROVES TO BE REAL LIFE BI-PARTY FEAST

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 2. — (AP) — After a scheduled bi-party political "funfeast" turned into a one-man circus here, the "guests"—at \$1.50 per plate with a 50-cent "processing tax"—today reflected on the proposal of a sheepman's utopia on a virgin Pacific island.

That, declared Fred W. Falconer, Pendleton, Ore., sponsor and ringmaster of last night's democrat-republican potpourri, would be a laudable project for the rehabilitation administration.

"Ship us sheepmen, flocks and families to a verdant island," he advised. "There we would be free to fleece our sheep without being fleeced by either a democrat or republican administration."

Most of the speakers Falconer had announced failed to appear. He said it might have been because he forgot to invite them.

"Huey Long salads" wilted, and "crack down" Johnson small potatoes from the menu went back for the plain fried spuds. The "Father Coughlin custard" curdled. But the "Herbert Hoover slumgullion" and "Franklin D. Roosevelt nuts" were served in ample portions.

H. A. Farmer, of Kalamazoo, Mich., was elected president of the association for the coming year, succeeding Frank X. Goulet of Los Angeles, and Battle Creek, Mich., was elected as the 1936 tournament site.

Team competition and a variety of stunt shooting was carried for the last of the five day meet on the campus of the University of California at Los Angeles.

Gilman Keasey of Corvallis, Ore., topped the 1935 title with a total point score of 2870 for the tournament, which included a new record of 1466 points for the double York shoot.

Mrs. Ruth Holger Modesto, Cal., sharpshooter, captured the women's title with a total score of 1902 points and set a new record of 844 points for a Columbia round.
