

FRESH EGGS SHY PORTLAND MARTS

PORTLAND, Aug. 2.—(AP)—There were no changes in butter and butterfat prices today. There was a real shortage of fresh eggs in the local trade but since the change in the law so that the stock cannot be called fresh, the trade is heaped with storage stuff mixed with current lay, much to the dissatisfaction of consumers. Tillamook reported a strong and higher market for cheese during the day and notified the trade of a rise of 1c for both triplets and loaf at 17-18c lb. there which means 19-20c lb. to Portland retailers. With prices unchanged generally, a rather quiet trading tone was showing for live chickens here. Prices continued much the same as a week ago. Active trading tone was showing for tomatoes with a gradual clean-up of the former burdensome offerings from California and Walla Walla. Blight was reported at Yakima. Some volume of old potatoes were again being offered out of Klamath Falls even though weeks ago the trade there reported everything sold. Quality was very good. Sales around \$1 cental. Peach market about steady with Elbertas 65-90 generally with a few higher. Hales \$1.15-1.25 for boxes and local Triumphs and Hales early continued chiefly 65-70c box.

STEWARDESS HURT FOREST SERVICE IN AIR CRASH TO POISON OAK CURE WED LUMBER KING

OAKLAND, Calif., Aug. 2.—(AP)—John H. Tyson, 36, left by plane yesterday for Cecil, W. Va., where in a few days he will wed Cornelia M. Pederman, United Air Lines stewardess who was the heroine of a plane crash at the Eugene, Ore., airport two and one-half years ago. Tyson, scion of a wealthy Piedmont, Calif., lumber family, met and fell in love with the pretty 26-year-old girl a few months ago when he was a passenger on a Seattle-bound plane, he said. In the Eugene crash Miss Pederman suffered a broken leg and severe lacerations, yet she directed search for passengers imprisoned in the cockpit and aided in their rescue. Tyson is the son of James Tyson, president of the Charles Nelson Lumber company.

PORTLAND, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The Oregon emergency relief administration today announced that it has purchased 350,000 bushels of wheat to be milled for direct relief work all over the United States. The price paid for the wheat purchased in this state has averaged from 75 to 78 cents a bushel, Portland. Both old and new wheat is being bought. The buying campaign continued about three weeks ago, will continue indefinitely and the amount purchased in Oregon probably will depend on whether the expected purchases in other states are made. It was reported here that no wheat had been purchased in Idaho yet under the campaign. Wool sales restricted. BOSTON, Aug. 2.—(AP)—U. S. D. INDUSTRY PROFIT FIGURES HIGHEST IN YEARS, CLAIM

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The slow change in the color of figures in the profit and loss column of corporations from a bright red to a light gray has focused the attention of financial authorities on current earnings reports. By and large, American business institutions are climbing higher out of the depression and are showing more favorable net profit reports, but analysts stress that the road ahead up the hill is longer than the portion already traveled. During April, May and June of this year, industrial corporations in the aggregate moved higher than the profit level of last year at this time, but the gain for the two periods was less than the first quarter of this year over the first quarter of last. Financial experts point out that the second quarter of 1934 was the high point of the year, but the third quarter earnings showed the worst comparison of that year. Industry now is facing the brightest outlook of the current year for the third quarter, and the comparison with last year should be highly favorable, it is predicted in some financial commentaries. In settling on the current earnings situation, the National City

Bank of New York in its monthly letter declared: "Even with the improvement indicated for the current year, the result for the six years 1930-35 combined for all manufacturing corporations in the United States, numbering about 90,000, will be no net return whatever on invested capital. . . . A compilation by the bank on the profits for the first half of this year made by 260 industrial corporations showed a raise of 17.9 per cent over the 1934 first half. Power Area Application.
