GIN WED LAW IN MONTANA BRINGS SHARP KICK-BACK

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 2.—(UP)—Montana's kick-back on the "gin marriage" law, which went into effect in that state July 1, may have a considerable influence on the Oregon legislature when it convenes for a special session this fall. As far as could be learned, there hadn't been a single marriage license granted in Montana during July. Montana senators sent Dan Cupid stumbling when they nailed him on the button with one of America's most far-reaching marriage laws. The act made it necessary for applicants for a marriage license to obtain a health certificate showing freedom from venereal disease, infectious tuberculosis and other inherent disease.

What caused real trouble, however, was a clause holding physicians responsible for a felony and liable to revocation of license in case of improper examination. Montana physicians flatly refused to sign any certificates, saying they would be held liable for any disease revealing itself after marriage. The only July weddings in the mining state were those for which licenses had been previously secured.

TRANSIENT BOYS HELD VAGRANTS

Frank Zinglinski, 20, who gave his home as Newburg, Oregon, and William Brooks, 19, who gave his home as Los Angeles, were yesterday sentenced to 30 days in the county jail, and assessed court costs of \$4.50 in justice court, on their plea of guilty to a vagrancy charge. The two young men, who had in their possession an old car for which they had no papers, had "no visible means of support," and have been "hanging around" town for several days, according to a report from the state police, who made the arrests.

Homemade Ice Cream

When the thermometer goes to 90 in the shade, our national summer dish, ice cream, in all its variations, reaches its summit of popularity. The sound of the freezer being cranked is sweet music to our ears. He was an ingenious American who invented the ice cream freezer. It was another ingenious American who further simplified and made economical the making of ice cream at home by invention of ice cream powder. The basic principle for making home-made ice cream with ice cream powder is simplicity itself—one quart of milk, or milk and cream, blended with a package of ice cream powder, then freeze. For the lucky owners of automatic refrigerators, the process is even simpler, since there is no crank to be turned. There are five versions of this convenient product—unflavored, vanilla, chocolate, strawberry and lemon. With these and a dash of culinary ingenuity, housewives can make an infinite variety of ice cream desserts.

Here are the master recipes for freezer ice cream and for automatic refrigerator ice cream, and recipes for two popular ice creams—coffee and fresh peach.

Master Recipe for Automatic Refrigerator Ice Cream.
1 package ice cream powder (vanilla, strawberry, lemon, or chocolate flavor)
4 tablespoons sugar
2 cups milk
2 cups cream, whipped.
Combine ice cream powder and sugar. Add milk very gradually, stirring until dissolved. Fold into whipped cream. Turn into freezing tray of automatic refrigerator and freeze as quickly as possible—about 6 hours usually required. Stir thoroughly three times during the first hour of freezing (cream should be thick for the third stirring). Makes about 1 1/2 quarts ice cream. (With chocolate ice cream powder, use 1/2 cup sugar.)

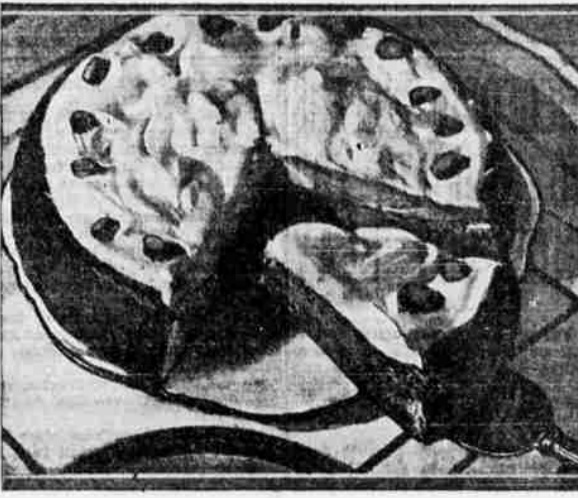
Master Recipe for Freezer Ice Cream
1 quart milk
1 package ice cream powder (vanilla, strawberry, lemon, or chocolate flavor)
Add milk very gradually to ice cream powder, stirring until dissolved. Freeze in freezer. Makes 1 1/2 quarts ice cream. Instead of the quart of milk in this recipe, you may prefer to use . . . 1 cup cream and 3 cups milk, or 1 cup evaporated milk and 3 cups milk or water. Either substitution will give fine results. (With chocolate ice cream powder, add 1/4 cup sugar.)

Coffee Ice Cream.
1 package unflavored ice cream powder
1 cup sugar
1 cup water
2 cups strong coffee
1 cup evaporated milk.
Combine ice cream powder and sugar, add water and coffee very gradually, stirring until dissolved. Then add evaporated milk. Freeze in freezer. Makes 1 1/2 quarts.

Fresh Peach Ice Cream.
1/2 cup sugar
Few drops almond extract
2 cups fresh peach pulp
2 cups milk
1 package unflavored ice cream powder
1 cup heavy cream.
Add sugar and almond extract to peach pulp and let stand while ice cream mixture is being made. Add milk very gradually to ice cream powder, stirring until dissolved; then add cream. Freeze in freezer until thick, but not hard; add sweetened peach pulp and continue freezing. Makes 1 1/2 quarts ice cream.

No Flour—No Butter In This Cake!



HOW in the world can a cake be made without using flour, butter and some kind of flavoring extract? The question is simply answered—use Brazil nuts and eggs. You would little suspect that these same long, hard-shelled holiday nibbles would, when passed through a food chopper, provide the necessary body for a cake. Nor perhaps would you think that their own natural oil would serve as a suitable shortening. Unblanched nuts produce the best flavor.

Brazil Nut Cake
Prepared as directed this cake will provide a deliciously different dessert. The recipe calls for:
2 cups ground Brazil nuts 1/2 teaspoon salt
6 eggs 1 cup sugar
Grind the nuts (about 1/2 pound shelled nuts or 1 1/2 cups before grinding) and mix with sugar and salt. Beat egg yolks until foamy and beat in sugar and nut mixture. Beat thoroughly and fold in beaten egg whites. Pour into 3 greased 8-inch layer cake pans. Bake in a moderate oven, 250 degrees F., for 30 minutes. Or pour mixture into a greased 8 1/2 inch tube pan or spring form and bake in a slow oven, 325 degrees F., for 20 minutes; raise the temperature to 375 degrees F. for 10 minutes and then decrease heat to 325 degrees F. for 30 minutes.

Frosting
2 egg whites, 5 tablespoons unbleached water
1 1/2 cups brown 1/4 pound cut or sugar, firmly whole Brazil nuts (1/2 cup packed whole nuts)

Salt
Put egg whites, sugar, salt and water in upper part of double boiler. Beat with an egg beater until well mixed. Place over rapidly boiling water, heating constantly with egg beater and cook 7 minutes, or until frosting will stand in peaks. Remove from fire. Beat until thick enough to spread. Frost cake and decorate with whole or cut Brazil nuts. Cut nuts may be sprinkled on top of each frosted layer.

MORGAN'S CALL ON AVERAGE OREGON PREMIER BALDWIN STIRS LABORITE

LONDON, Aug. 2.—(AP)—A labor party member's question as to why J. P. Morgan, American financier, called on Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin was answered in the house of commons today by Baldwin himself.

"The member is under a misapprehension in thinking J. P. Morgan paid an official visit to 10 Downing street," stated the prime minister in a written answer. "Mr. Morgan is an old personal friend of mine with whom I have stayed in New York. He always comes to see me when he is in this country. I hope he will continue to do so."

The question was asked by J. McGovern, Glasgow laborite, who said he thought that, inasmuch as Morgan's visit to the prime minister had been reported in America, the house of commons ought to know all about it.

Without a formal vote, the house passed Baldwin's motion that "if the public interest requires" it should meet again earlier than October 29.

FEDERAL RULE OF INTERSTATE BUS, TRUCKS PLEAS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—(AP) Government officials and a truck operators' group united today in expressing satisfaction with house passage of a senate-approved bill regulating interstate movement of buses and trucks. "It will help the railroads. It will also help the truck and bus industries and it will not eliminate competition in the transportation field," he said. He did not believe federal regulation of buses and trucks would mean higher rates.

J. W. Blood, vice-president of the American Trucking Association, Inc., said operators would "be delighted to co-operate with the interstate commerce commission." "We have been working for some time for reasonable and fair regulation and this fills the gap."

The bill now goes back to the senate for concurrence in several minor amendments. Urged early in the session by President Roosevelt, it places both common and contract carriers, buses and trucks, under the interstate commerce commission, but generally exempts private truckers, and trucks hauling farm products, fish, shell fish, or newspapers and farm co-operative trucks.

VIGILANTES MAUL FRUIT AGITATORS

SANTA ROSA, Calif., Aug. 2.—(UP)—Threatened strike troubles in the rich apple-growing sections near Sebastopol reached a climax today when 150 men raided a meeting of alleged communists and forced the group to disband.

Vernon Healey, candidate for state senator last fall on the communist party ticket, and Louis Lagomarsino, communist party candidate for the state assembly, were given hospital treatment for injuries sustained in beatings administered by the "vigilantes."

Two other men suffered minor hurts in a melee which followed breakup of the meeting.

ASK TROOPS FOR CALIFORNIA MINE

JACKSON, Cal., Aug. 2.—(UP)—An appeal for national guard aid to maintain order in the Amador mine strike had been forwarded to Governor Frank Merriam's office today by George Wilson, president of the Mother Lode miners' union of Jackson, and John Franco, a member of the union.

The appeal awaited the governor's return to Sacramento from a southern California trip for action. Last night "vigilantes" clashed in a street fight with union members when the latter attempted to retain a sign that carried a warning to all strikebreakers. More than 200 self-appointed deputies and officers mixed with approximately 20 union members; it was said.

DENVER BANDITS ROB REALTOR IN SIGHT OF CROWD

DENVER, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Three gunmen escaped with \$24,000 in cash, stocks and jewelry today after they held up Max Schwartz, real estate man in his office on a downtown street. Two men left a parked car and followed Schwartz as he opened his office. They drew guns and forced Schwartz to unlock the safe, which they ransacked. The robbery occurred within sight of scores of pedestrians who passed on the sidewalk, separated from the office only by a plate glass window. The loot included \$12,000 worth of stocks, which were non-negotiable and \$800 in cash. The gunmen overlocked \$2000 in cash that was in the safe.

After the robbery they warned Schwartz not to notify police and then fled in their car, with a third man driving.

Skimming Jelly

Do you bang your spoon on the sink when you're skimming jelly? If you're like most women, you do and you bang and bang, and still the spoon doesn't get completely clean. Well, Frances Lee Barton, famous home economist, suggests a little trick that is so simple you'll wonder why you didn't think of it yourself.

She puts a bowl of hot water conveniently near her, and dips the spoon into the water every time she skims. Result, no bent spoon or wasted energy . . . and a fine, clear jelly. Here, by the way, is one of her favorite recipes:

Wild Cherry Jelly.
3 cups (1 1/2 lbs.) juice
5 1/2 cups (2 1/2 lbs.) sugar
1 bottle fruit pectin.
To prepare juice, stem about 3 pounds fully ripe cherries. Add 3 cups water. Bring to a boil, cover and simmer 15 minutes. (For strong cherry pit flavor, add 4 tablespoons crushed pits during simmering, or 1/4 teaspoon almond extract before pouring.) Place fruit in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. Measure sugar and juice into large sauce-
