HOOVER, VISITOR TALK POLITICS



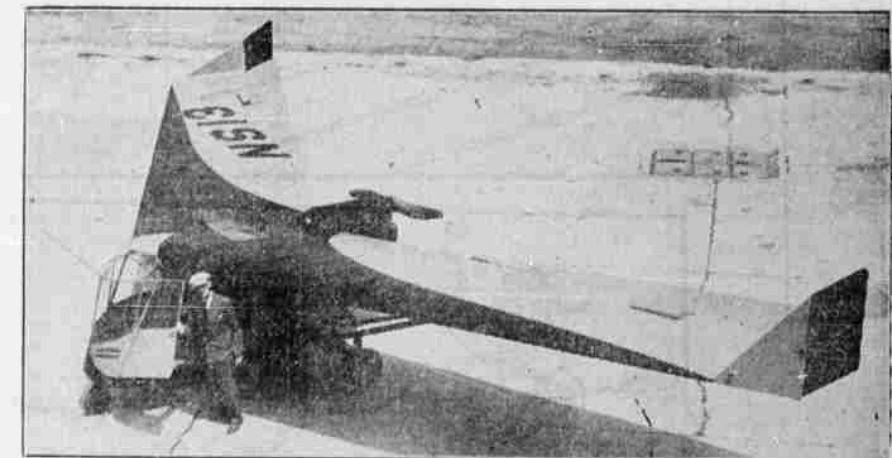
