

# "Brown Bomber" Ends Training, 3-to-1 Favorite Over Kingfish

## LEVINSKY RATED IN FINEST SHAPE OF RING CAREER

### Wednesday Night Fight At Chicago Assured Financial Success With Heavy Advance Sale.

CHICAGO, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Stolid Joe Louis came to the end of a three weeks training sledge tonight, ready to all appearances, to continue his devastating march through the heavyweight division at the expense of Chicago's King Levinsky next Wednesday night at Comiskey park.

After watching the brown bomber belt five sparring partners around and out, observers figured that Louis amounted to a 3 to 1 favorite to win his 24th consecutive professional battle. With his spectacular triumph over Primo Carnera only three weeks behind him when he started training, the Detroit Negro had no trouble getting into condition.

He scaled 193 pounds today, three and one-half pounds under the weight he hurled against Carnera.

The noisy, wild-swinging kingfish, face to face with an opportunity to make the faithful forget about that two-round knockout administered by Max Baer last December in the Chicago stadium, still has a couple of days of work to be done. He, too, has reached the finest condition of his eventful career.

Regardless of what Louis or Levinsky do or fail to do, in the ring, the battle, Chicago's most significant heavyweight offering in several years, seems certain of doing all right financially.

Promoter Joe Foley said the cash advance had reached \$90,000 tonight.

## ALABAMA MENTOR TAKES VOTE LEAD

CHICAGO, Aug. 3.—(AP)—A huge vote from the "solid South" today boosted Frank Thomas of Alabama, back into the lead in the poll to name a head coach for the college all-star football team which meets the Chicago Bears at Soldier Field August 29.

The Dixie vote lifted Thomas from this plane with a total of 1,141,655 points. Edward P. (Skip) Madigan of St. Mary's, who led yesterday, was second with 1,136,629, and Bo McMillin of Indiana, sixth yesterday, moved up to third with 1,122,013.

Charles Bachman of Michigan State dropped from second to fourth with a 1,121,584 total, and Dr. C. W. Spears of Wisconsin, slipped from fourth to fifth at 1,085,798.

Elmer Layden, of Notre Dame, was sixth with 1,068,982, and Bernie Bierman of Minnesota, had 934,252 for seventh.

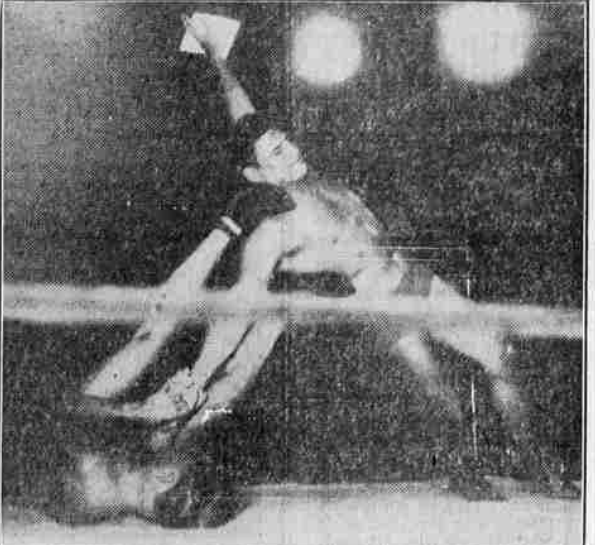
## BROOKLYN YOUTH WINS MUNDY TITLE

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 3.—(AP)—The smallest boy became the biggest man today when 18-year-old Frankie Stracale, Brooklyn high school boy, stepped up before cheering thousands and was crowned king of the public links golf players of the United States.

Frankie, the schoolboy king, won the crown with a putter, dropping in a treacherous downhill putt from six feet on the 37th hole of one of the most exciting finals in the championship's history to defeat Joe Coris, the "kid" cop from St. Paul.

The overtime duel between the frail looking Minnesota blonde and the dapper 125-pound brunette from the Bay ridge section of Brooklyn was the second in the national public links championship's 14 years of play. The result gave the show its youngest champion.

## HOUSEWIVES PLAN GENERAL STRIKE IN FOOD COST WAR

DETROIT, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Haitramck housewives, whose meat strike progressed from hair-pulling to jailstorming and forced more than half the butcher shops in that and other suburban centers to close, announced today that the movement is only the start of a "general strike against the high cost of living."

The strikers' statement, signed by Mrs. Mary Zuk, their leader, said they intend to win their fight for lower meat prices and "to go on to the other necessities of life." It included a denial of the accusation that the strike is communistic.

Three women and man, arrested in a melee which followed attempts of a crowd to pour kerosene on meat being unloaded at a packing plant late yesterday, were convicted of disturbing the peace today and placed on three months probation each.

## DWARF WHO SHOT BEAUTY TO CELL

OSAGE, Iowa, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Marshall (Shorty) Bascombe, the dwarf who loved a pretty waitress but shot her when she refused his love, was sentenced today to serve 30 years in prison.

He asked for it. The dwarf, who never grew taller than many a man's belt buckle, called officers to his jail cell this morning.

"There's no use my waiting two months in jail here for the grand jury to investigate my case," he said. "I want to plead guilty and get it over with."

"Shorty" pleaded guilty to assault with intent to murder. The waitress, Marie Meggett, 23, who won a beauty contest here July 4 is showing steady recovery.
