# Haggard Novel On Craterian Screen

A sincere and imaginative adaptation of H. Rider Haggard's novel to screen requirements, "SHE," which opened yesterday at the Craterian theater, is impressive entertainment.

The production retains all the fantasy and drama of the book, and reinforces it with such skillful technical photography and beautiful architectural settings that the result is a triumph of motion picture spectacle.

The story takes Leo Vincy and Archibald Holly, English scientists, into the mysterious kingdom of Kor in a search for the source of eternal life. With them is Tanya, daughter of a trader. The long trek across the wastes to reach Kor is remarkable for the beauty and credibility of the photography. After the adventures reach Kor, the drama resolves itself into a romantic battle between "SHE," immortal empress of Kor, and the mortal Tanya, with Leo the object of contention. Suspense and fast-paced action arise out of jealousy, hate, and fear, natural to the situation.

Helen Mack is at her dramatic best in the difficult role of the mortal Tanya. Randolph Scott justifies the promise he gave of dramatic abilities after graduating from westerns to "Roberta." Particular praise is merited for the lavishly spectacular scenes, such as the Glacier of the Sabre Toothed Tiger, the Cave of Smokes,

the vast Hall of Kings, and the Crater of the Eternal Flame.

# AIR CORPS CHIEF FLIES OVER CITY

Brigadier General Henry H. Arnold, commander of the first wing, United States army air corps, with headquarters at March Field, Cal., passed over Medford in his big army plane at 11:15 a. m. today en route south from Seattle.
