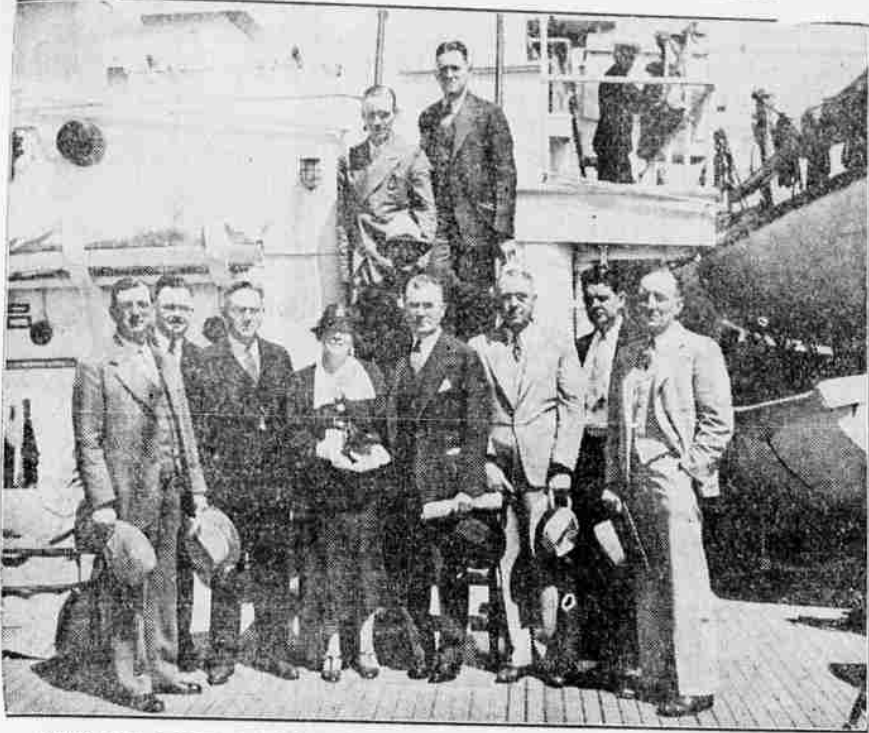


### INVESTIGATE MANTANUSKA FOR CONGRESS



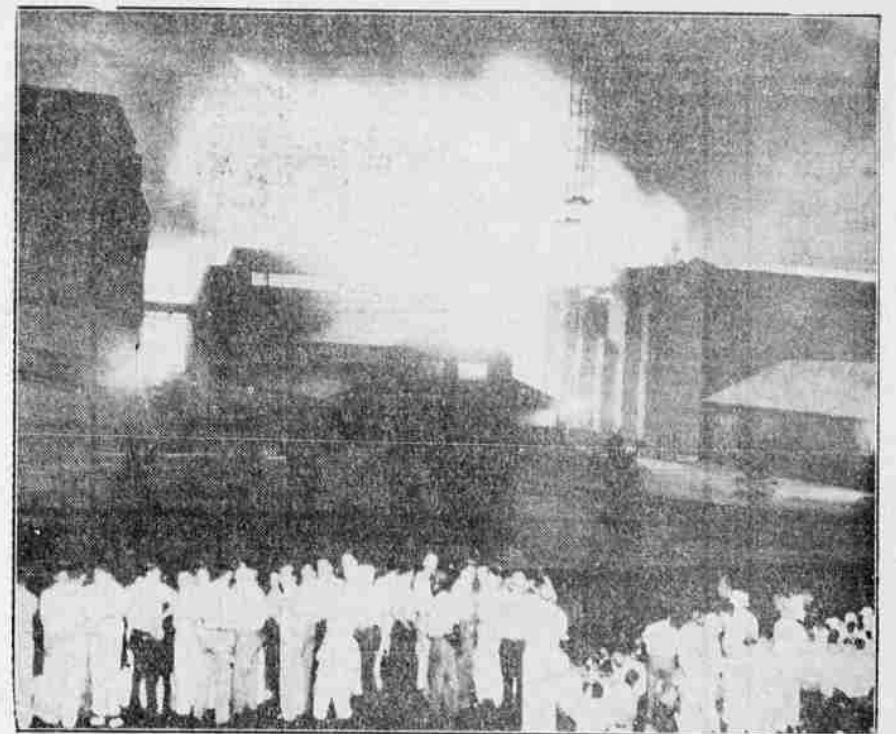

### KING GEORGE RETURNS FROM REST



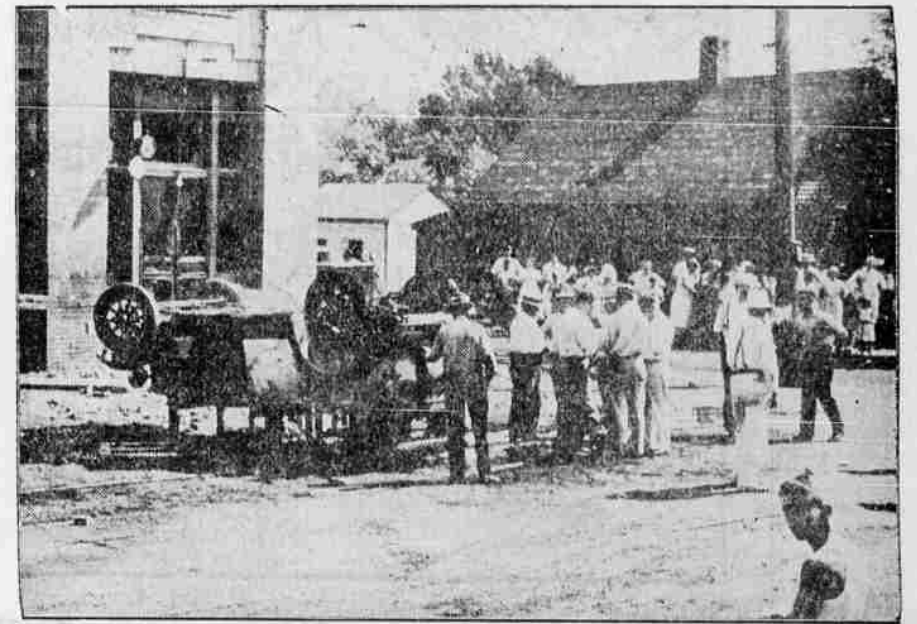
