WOODBURN, Ore., Aug. 10.—(AP)—The Junior league baseball championship of Oregon lay between the Sugar Crest team of Portland and the nine from The Dalles tonight, as a result of the semi-final play-off here this afternoon.

In today's games, the Sugar Crest aggregation defeated Roseburg's entry 6 to 1, behind the five-hit pitching of 200-pound Jack Shaw.

OHIO LEGISLATOR WHO AIDED NEGRO RACER, TO RESCUE

CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 10.—(AP)—State Representative Sydney A. Hesse, of Cuyahoga county, said tonight he would defend Jesse Owens during an investigation by the Northeastern Ohio A. A. U. of Owens' amateur status.

Hesse was co-sponsor of a resolution which gave Owens, Ohio State track star, a job as "temporary" page in the Ohio legislature. The legislator said Owens was not given the job because of his athletic achievements, but because "I thought his services might be needed even though the legislature was not in session."

Owens has been called to appear before the A. A. U. body Monday to tell his story of receiving \$150 from the state as an honorary page since the legislature adjourned June 5.

Lou N. Bloom, president of the A. U. said yesterday Owens' standing as an amateur might be jeopardized if he accepted money from the state for work he did not perform.

Owens, at his home here, said he thought "everything would turn out all right."

"Why, I wouldn't turn professional for the world," he said.

COAST PREXY TO STAY OUT SEASON

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Hyland R. Baggerly, president of the Pacific Coast league, today announced he would not be a candidate for re-election to that office when the annual fall meeting is held in October.

The statement came out of a meeting here with directors of the Los Angeles, Hollywood and Seattle baseball clubs, during which Bill Klepper, president of the Seattle Indians, suggested the league prexy resign.

Baggerly stated he was willing to resign immediately if the directors chose, but in view of the developments it was indicated no action would be taken now, since the season has only six weeks more to run.

LOUIS PICKED AS PRIZE RING KING

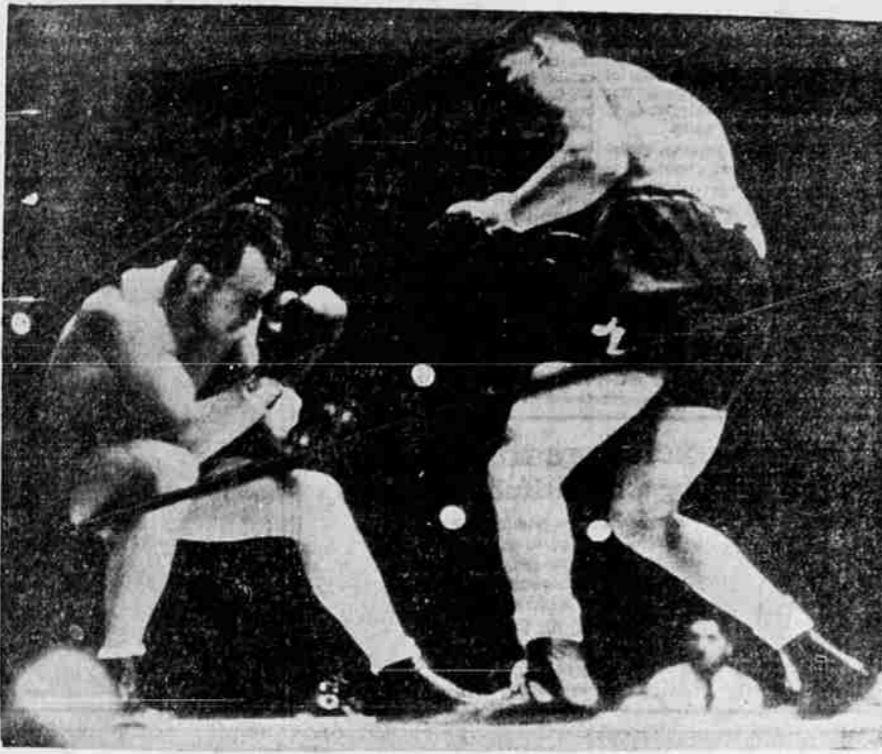
