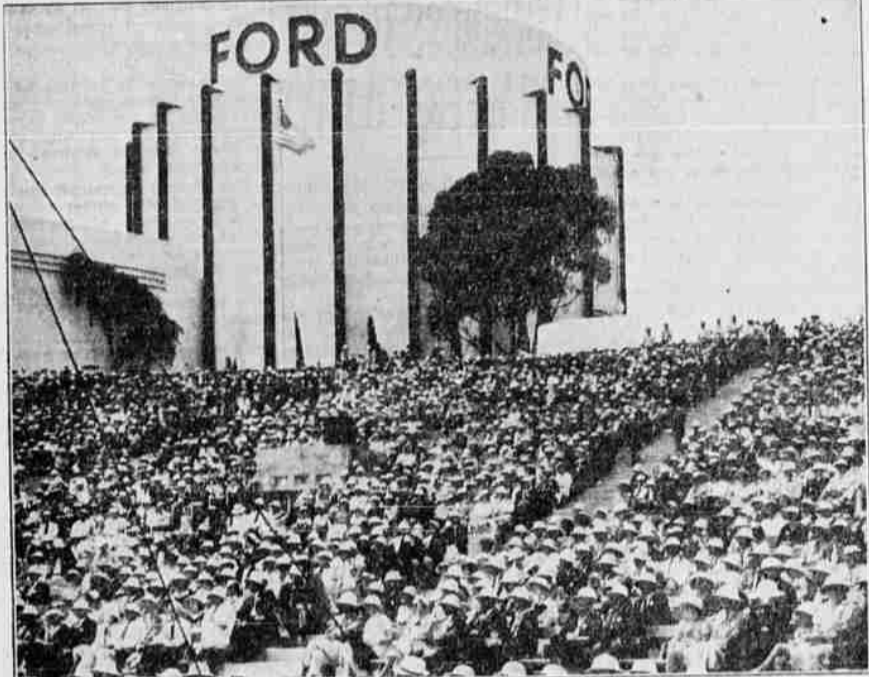

BURNED RECORDS OF REDMAN LODGE HELD DEATH CLUE

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 10.—(AP)—Investigation proceeded today in the death of Mr. and Mrs. George C. Cates, who died following a fire which destroyed a portion of their home here early yesterday, but officers admitted they were without definite clues.

Mrs. Cates was found in bed in the smoke-filled residence, lying in a pool of blood which flowed from a wound in her head. Cates died while artificial means of respiration were being applied soon after he was dragged to the streets by city police.

Officers at first leaned toward the theory the house had been set afire by a prowler, who had been active in past weeks in the vicinity of the case home.

Sheriff W. T. Morrow yesterday, however, said he believed the key to what appeared to him as a murder might lie in the burned accounts of the lodge in which Cates was secretary.

John Ernest, deputy grand sachem of the Kluksux tribe No. 3, of the Red Men, told officers Cates had an appointment with him last night at the Cates' home to discuss lodge affairs.

The theory that a prowler was responsible for the fire was temporarily abandoned when it was discovered that while the Cates home had been ransacked considerable money was left intact and only lodge records were destroyed.

Major Provisions Of Social Security Measure As Passed

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Here are the major provisions of the social security measure, which President Roosevelt regards as his most important legislative recommendation:

Old Age Grants
Beginning immediately, the federal government will offer up to \$15 a month, to be matched by the states, for aid to needy citizens above 65 years of age. Until July 1, 1937, states with constitutional prohibitions would not have to match the federal grants.

Old Age Pensions
Beginning in 1937, employers and employees each will pay into a nation-wide old age pension fund one per cent of the salary of the worker up to \$3,000 a year. The tax will be increased one-half per cent for each, every three years, until it reached three per cent, each, or a total of six per cent, in 1940. This fund will not cover agricultural, domestic, casual, governmental or charity workers.

Unemployment Insurance
Employers of eight or more persons, except agricultural, domestic, family, governmental or charity workers, will pay a one per cent payroll tax beginning on this year's wages, two per cent next year, and three per cent thereafter. From this they will be permitted to deduct up to 90 per cent, provided it is paid into state unemployment insurance systems.

HOOVER AT 62 ON WAY TO BUSINESS, POLITICAL MEETS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Herbert Hoover entered his sixty-second year today, a figure of political mystery to many.

The anniversary of that day in 1874, when he was born the son of a blacksmith at West Branch, Iowa, found him again enroute east from California. Business meetings will hold him in New York from Monday through Wednesday.

New opportunities to confer with the Republican leaders will be afforded there, at a time when the new deal setback in Rhode Island has encouraged party organizers to greater efforts against the administration.

Because of the former president's increasing contacts with the G. O. P. command, his greater readiness of late to speak out on national policy, and uncertainty at the capital as to his personal intentions regarding 1936, more than usual attention will be given him in any activity of a political savor.
