Hand-Made Slips, Nightgowns, Juvenile Garments Also Found On Second Floor—Fall Stocks Ready

Ladies with too many curves and those with not enough are confident that they can remedy the situation with foundation garments recommended by Mrs. Elsie Narreagan, manager of the corset, underwear, hosiery and juvenile departments at Mann's store.

Through seasons when flat chests and no hips were in vogue to other years when Venus forms were more admired, Mrs. Narreagan has corseted hundreds of Mann's patrons during her 14 years of association with this popular southern Oregon store. Stays and unpleasant lacings have practically been discarded in favor of lighter weight two-way stretch elastic foundations which produce attractive figures without discomfort.

Venus, Formfit and Camp surgical garments are featured in Mann's corset department which now has a more complete selection of merchandise from which to choose correct sizes and styles.

Women's apparel this year and for the new season requires proper foundation for figure control, and corsets, girdles and brassieres are almost as important as the dresses they cover, according to Mrs. Narreagan, who is a graduate corsetier of two eastern corset companies.

Hand-made nightgowns and slips for fall and winter are now being displayed in the underwear department along with many other interesting articles. Rollins and Holeproof hosiery are both favorite brands at Mann's, where other well-known hose is also carried. A few of the spiky colors for autumn are ginger, nutmeg, cinnamon and clove.

Juvenile garments for ages eight to 14 are located on the second floor and are also under the supervision of Mrs. Narreagan. Shirley Temple dresses in fall styles will attract considerable attention among Medford's very young set, she predicts. This department will have an unusually large stock in readiness for school wardrobes.

FIRE FIGHTERS SEE TOLL OF WILD LIFE IN BEAGLE DISTRICT

CAMP WIMER, Aug. 14.—(Sp.)—Twenty-five Wimer CCO fire fighters who with Lt. C. W. Kenyon and Foreman Coy brought the Table Rock creek fire under control Saturday afternoon had an opportunity to see the death and destruction of wild life caused by careless persons responsible for forest fires.

Grey digger squirrels and rabbits in large numbers fled before the fire which swept through the brush so fast that many were trapped. The CCO members saw one digger squirrel, its side gashed by sharp brush and the pads of its feet burned off, limping painfully along in the wake of the blaze. One large rabbit ran by the fire line, its fur on fire and smoking like the braids tied to the tails of foxes in Scriptural times. Oddly enough the men failed to see a single rattlesnake. The wise serpents had taken to the rocks and to holes in the ground.

The fire burned over 175 acres on Table Rock creek between Beagle district and Sams Valley.

Swinging doors at each booth have eliminated the necessity for drapes. There are Venetian blinds at the large front windows. Ten Paramount Multi-Dryers are controlled through a central cabinet, and approximately 35 per cent saving is made by the Paramount in drying time, according to Mr. Murray.

BONNEVILLE TRANSIENT MAY HAVE SLAIN HAMM IS NEW POLICE THEORY

PENDLETON, Ore., Aug. 14.—(AP)—The possibility was advanced by police today that Roy Hamm, 21, found beaten to death near Meacham on August 6, may have picked up his hitch-hiker assailant at the Bonneville dam the morning he was killed.

Officers who have investigated the case have concluded that an unidentified hitch-hiker killed Hamm as he slept in a deserted ranch house near Meacham. Hamm's head was crushed by a 10-pound steel bar. He had been robbed of what little money he carried.

A camera, recently found and identified as Hamm's was said today to have contained pictures taken at Bonneville. Many transients loiter in the vicinity of the project and police

believe Hamm may have given one of them a ride in his automobile. Hamm left Portland the morning of July 26, en route for Pocatello, Idaho. He was seen at several service stations between Portland and Meacham in the company of a tall, sharply featured man, roughly dressed, and wearing a black hat.

LINEN, DRAPERIES AT QUALITY, PRICE FOUND IN CITIES

In addition to supervising the piece goods, linen, drapery and bedding department at Mann's store, A. Slettenengren had another object in view when he accepted the position in Medford last April. Mr. Slettenengren was instrumental in securing state game control in Washington, and in causing the removal of salmon traps in Puget Sound. In the northern state he was associated with Fredrick and Nelson's for 14 years and following that time was with Olds-Wortman and King for six months. Mann's new employee is thoroughly conversant with all phases of home furnishing and decorating as well as being a style critic when it comes to materials and colors in piece goods. "It is my intention that the people of Medford may be able to purchase at Mann's all reasonable goods of the same quality and at the same prices to be found in large cities without going to San Francisco or Portland," Mr. Slettenengren stated. His department will feature an especially complete stock of merchandise, much of which was selected during a recent buying trip to the San Francisco market.

An innovation at Mann's is the downstairs store just completed and where the shopper may find bedding, including nationally advertised blankets such as Kenwood, Pendleton and 'Arbault's. Draperies and curtains of all kinds are also downstairs. This will be a fascinating place for Medford kiddies before long, as it will contain the entire toy department.

As far back as 1912 Hugo Slettenengren, father of Mann's Seattle toy buyer, was interested in considerable Rogue River valley orchard land. The latter was in Medford in 1924 and since then he reports many en-

couraging improvements and said yesterday that he is well-pleased with the town, its people and the surrounding scenic places.

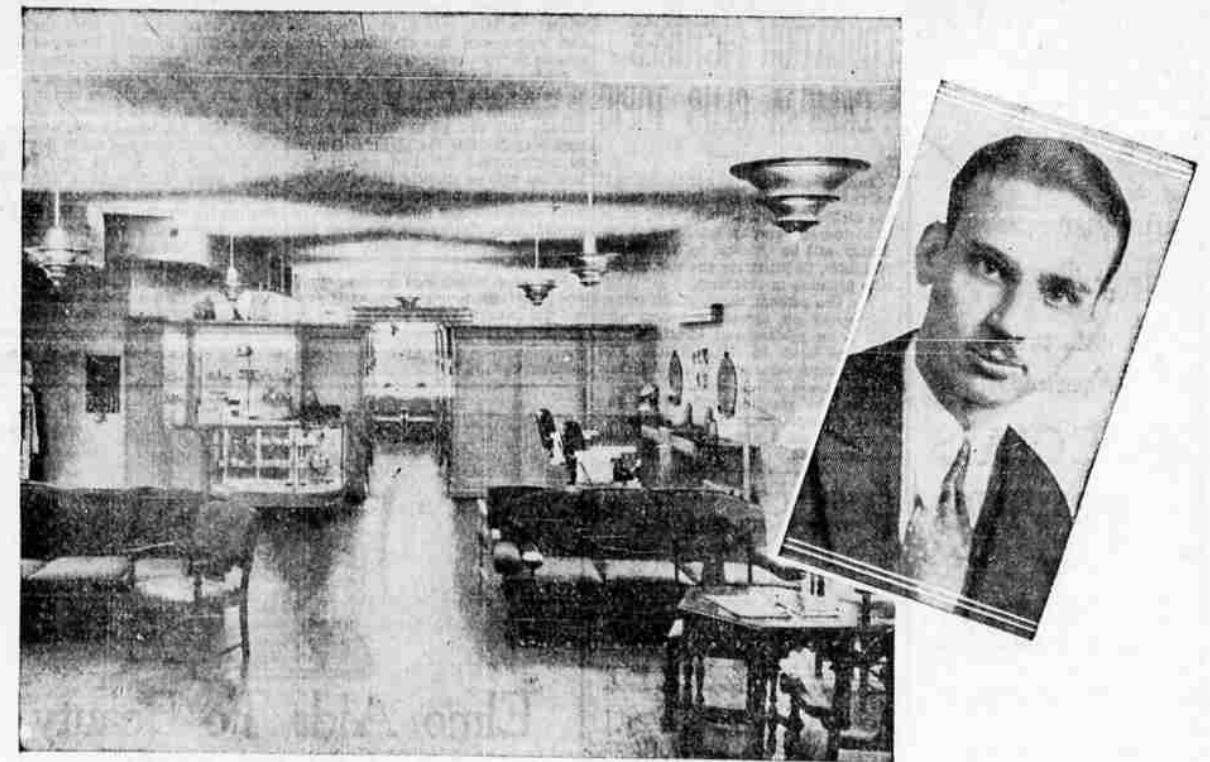
