The Douglas county men are transported from Roseburg to Medford by officials of the Umpqua National Forest and are sent from Medford by trucks, furnished by the blaster rust control, to camps located in Douglas lake in the vicinity of Diamond Lake. The entire quota of men has not been sent to date due to the fact that full camp facilities are not yet available.

Today's figures show the quota to be short from 70 to 100 men and it is believed this number can be furnished. The original order from the forest service was for 29 men and this order has been filled. All of the new work is under the new WPA relief set-up and all men must be from relief rolls. Wages are from \$35 to \$50 and meals. Fruit picking will start next week and no shortage of workers is expected.

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ture not found in any other pear. This the canners realize," he stated, "but they also realize that by withholding offers until it is too late for the fast ripening fruit to be packed for the fresh fruit market, they can force the grower into a disastrously low price bracket."

One of the men at the meeting today, familiar with the federal loan situation, stated on his personal guarantee that the government would be willing to subscribe from 75 to 80 per cent of the total money required. The Jackson County Chamber of Commerce has extended an offer of 100 per cent cooperation in the matter, as have all of the other growers contacted, who were not at the meeting. A local banker is acting in an advisory capacity.

The canners would be mutually owned by the growers themselves, placing them in so advantageous a position that they would never again be forced to meet the canners' prices. Leverette pointed out. The canned pears could be held for the best market, and could be picked at the best time of year.

There were 14,500 tons of Bartlett's harvested in the valley last year, and the estimate for the present season will exceed that by 500 tons. This would net the growers in this vicinity a saving of thousands of dollars, and bring to Medford a new industry which would take its place as one of the most profitable in southern Oregon.

The canners would be built primarily for the pear canning. Leverette stated, but a system would probably be worked out whereby other products could be put up. The man to investigate the Portland canning situation will be selected and sent north sometime next week, it was learned.

Emblems of Eagle Just Waste Paper Postmasters Told

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—(AP)—NRA emblems and other material connected with the blue eagle era are so much "waste paper" now to the postoffice department.

In a letter to postmasters, W. W. Hoover, first assistant postmaster general, today directed that all NRA material be removed from bulletin boards, that reemployment agreements, certificates and similar materials be forwarded to state heads, and:

"All other NRA material to be destroyed or disposed of as waste paper."

Hoover's instructions are based on "information received" from the national recovery administration.
