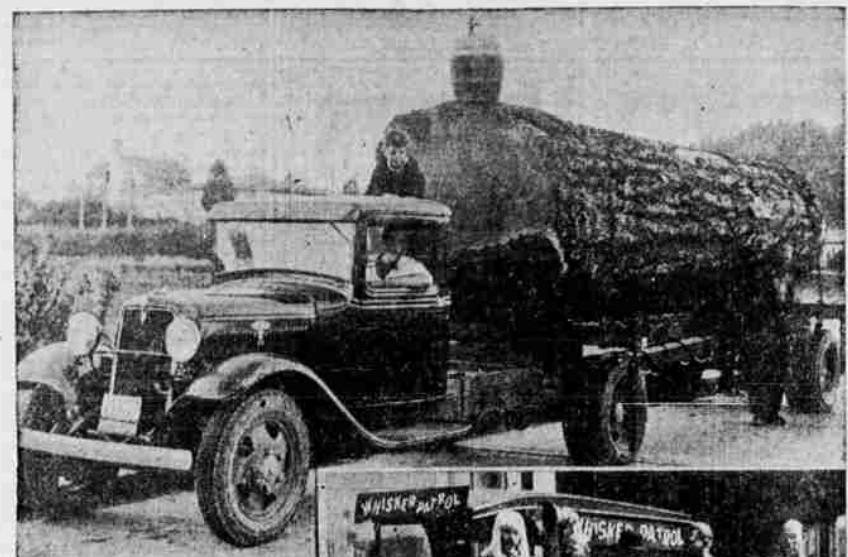
He was recognized while working here from a "wanted" circular sent out by the post office department of the federal government.

The federal circular issued for posting bore the following information about Stoppel: "Stoppel is believed to be traveling in an old automobile. He may be accompanied by his wife and three children, a girl 9, a boy, Bobby, 7, and a younger boy."

The circular stated that: "It is believed that practically all of the stolen Ronald orders have been cashed or spoiled and destroyed. It is quite possible, however, that Stoppel will attempt to secure additional money order forms from some other post office and will continue his operation. He is a clever check forger and confidence man."

Local police and the federal agent were mum as to how the government was aware that Stoppel was the man wanted. They would not say whether he was apprehended here because of an attempt to pass money orders or not.

Helping Paul Bunyan Celebrate His Birthday in Marshfield



Paul Bunyan, legendary Oregon lumberjack king who was reputed to have been born with five storks working over time and to have worn his father's clothes within a week afterward, will be honored with a three-day celebration day and night at Marshfield, Ore., August 22, 23 and 24. Hundreds of dollars in cash prizes have been offered in various loggers' contests, water carnival events and in air races and circus to be held Saturday afternoon the closing day and on Sunday, August 25, at the Marshfield airport with more than fifty planes from Portland and the northwest competing. LEGION'S LEADER SAYS COMMUNISTS SEEKING REVOLT

THE DALLAS, Ore., Aug. 15.—(P)—The American Legion sounded again today its battle cry of war on communists.

National Commander Frank N. Belgrano Jr. declared "the enemies of our republic" are "calling openly for a revolution to overthrow our form of government and set up in its place political and social slavery."

Belgrano told Oregon department Legionnaires, assembled in their 17th annual convention, that "in their newspapers and from the public rostrum, agents of communism preach their doctrine of destruction." He argued that freedom of speech and freedom of the press must "end every treason begins." He called upon "every patriotic American to join us in this war on the enemies of our republic."

"What America needs," Commander Belgrano said, "is an immediate and thorough reawakening of the spirit of Americanism."

The national commander, who will leave by plane tomorrow for Tacoma to attend the Washington department convention, dealt at length with the problem of America's "deadly enemies," outlined again the Legion's

I had a part in bringing about a little ruckus in Berlin. That is, I was not in Berlin at the time but I wondered whether one could stand the dirty work of the Jews.

"I do not see how men of honor can spread lies as they do about us. I am represented in the foreign press as a bloody car. Look at me and see whether you can see blood. Only occasionally when I shave can you see a cloth of blood."

His speech was in an area of which Jews form 21 per cent of the population.

Meanwhile, measures against Jews which are gradually eliminating them from business piled up. The principal Jewish paper, "Israelitische Amlenblatt," was ordered suppressed until November 10.

Four Jewish-owned theaters in Hanover were closed by the police after a street demonstration against them.

The mayor of Dortmund issued an order forbidding the Jews either to patronize the municipal pawnshop or attend its auctions.

Silver Purchasing Fails To Aid Price

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—(AP) Secretary Morgenthau said today the government was "still buying" silver.

That statement at his press conference followed announcement last night that more than 25,000,000 ounces of the white metal was purchased yesterday in an effort to stem declining prices.

Despite heavy buying by the treasury, the world price continued to decline today, although at a slower pace than yesterday.

FOUR DIE IN CRASH ON TEXAS AIRLINE

GILMER, Tex., Aug. 15.—(AP)—Four persons died early today in a trimotored ship of the Delta Airlines that crashed and burned after circling a cotton field in a vain attempt to land safely.

The dead: Andy Dixon, of Monroe, La., pilot; Herbert Buckley, Dallas, co-pilot; J. W. Thompson, Atlanta, passenger; P. A. Ivy, Birmingham, Ala., passenger.

The bodies, burned beyond recognition, were pulled from the ship by Guy Weldon and Herbert McWhorter, farmers, who heard the plane circle over McWhorter's cotton field shortly before the smashup.

Weldon said he heard the roar of the motor and looked up to see the plane drop several times. It circled over the level cotton patch as if to land, and then crashed at about a 20 degree angle with a loud explosion.

Some mail from the passenger-mail plane, which left Dallas last night for Atlanta, was retrieved before being burned.

Cause of the accident was not learned immediately.
