YOUTH CONFESSES "THRILL" SLAYING OF GIRL



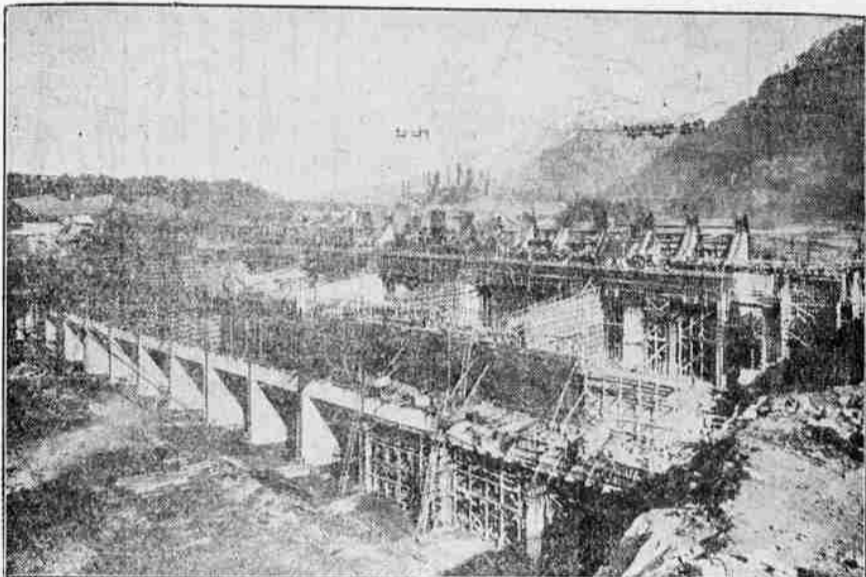

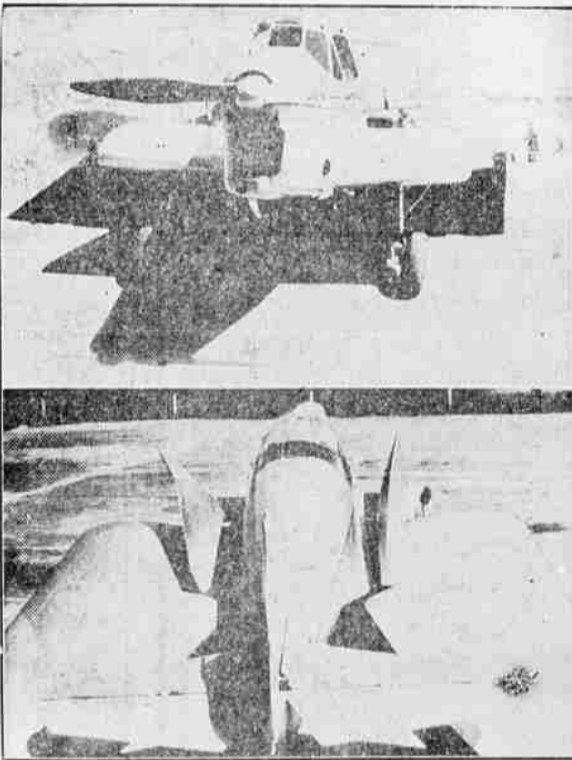

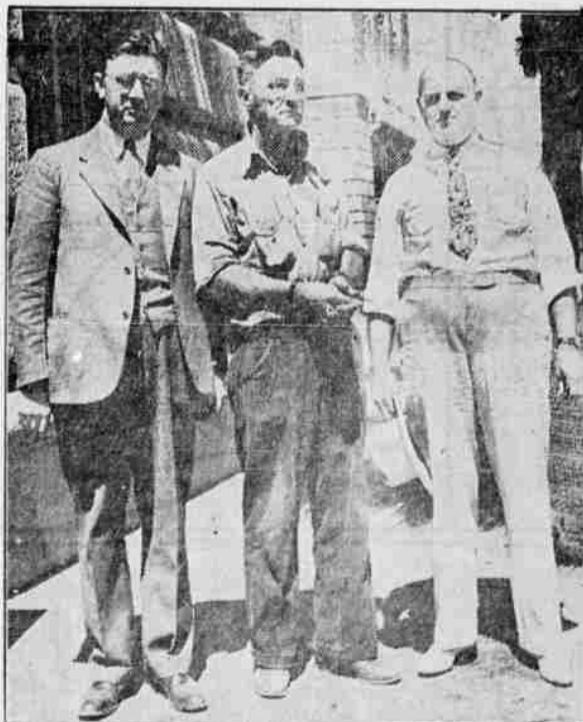

HOGS SOLD AT FIVE-YEAR HIGH



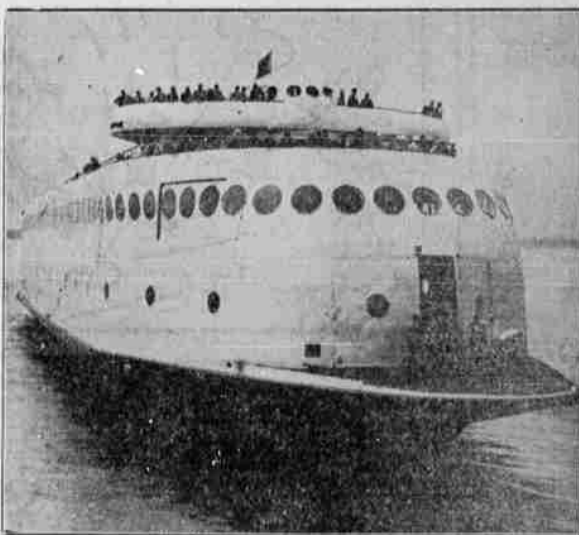
