TRI-MOTOR PLANE MAKES TAXI-HOPS
A giant Ford tri-motored airplane, "Silver Eagle," arrived in Medford yesterday, piloted by Capt. Eddie DeLam, former chief test pilot for the Ford Motor company, to spend a week here in carrying passengers over the city, on a 15 mile loop trip.

The graceful Ford ship, one of the latest built by the Ford company, is powered by three Pratt and Whitney "Wasps," the trio turning up 1275 horsepower. There is comfortable room for 14 passengers at a time, and featured on the frequent flights will be night trips over the city, said Ken Clark, manager of the big ship. "We'll make flights all night if we can get enough passengers. And at the small charge that we're making, it's beginning to look as though that's just what we'll have to do to accommodate the crowds."

The airplane is here while on a tour of the United States. The night flights over the cities of the country have proven immensely popular. The ship, licensed by the department of commerce, is owned by the Pacific Airlines company.

Moving Drama
The drama of the situation deeply moved the crowd at the airport, among them high civic and state representatives.

The motors were warmed up, still hardly cool from their flight north this morning from Alameda, Calif. The plane was taxied slowly to the runway, a siren sounded, a white flag dropped, and the big ship, like a great silver bullet, raced down the airway and lifted gracefully into the air.

Previously, Colonel Young had declared that Los Angeles was their destination, but he said out of respect for the Rogers and Post families he could not reveal the landing field there. From a credible source it was learned that the bodies would probably be taken to the Pearson funeral home, in Los Angeles, on arriving there.

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., Aug. 19.—(AP)—The bodies of Will Rogers and Wiley Post were being returned here today, brought back from that aerial voyage Rogers had said would end, for him, "just somewhere."

Their remains were to be taken directly to a mortuary at Forest Lawn Memorial Park.

Despite the unbounded affection felt, generally, for Will Rogers, some fear was expressed of untoward incidents, such as have attended the funerals of other film stars. Every safeguard will be employed, both today and at the funeral services, Thursday, friends said.

A private ceremony for Rogers family will be performed Thursday, at Forest Lawn. Mrs. Rogers requested it be led by the Rev. J. Whitcomb Broucher, Sr., who cancelled an evangelical campaign at Seaside, Ore., to return here.

The comedian's body then will be interred in a crypt at Forest Lawn, not far from those of two of his closest friends in life, Marie Dressler and Florenz Ziegfeld, theatrical producer.
