DELAY IN CHOICE OF CAPITOL SITE IRRITATES BOARD



Action Needed Before Sen. McNary Leaves Washington—Special Session Pends Complete Program

SALEM, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Spurred on by telegrams from Senator Charles I. McNary urging haste in selection of a proposed site for the new capitol and determination if additional land is to be obtained, the state board of control Monday called upon members of the groups investigating additional sites for immediate action.

Nothing News Done

"It has been three months now and apparently nothing has been done. We want more land, we must have it, and it is up to Salem and other civic organizations to assist. I have urged the board's committee to make an immediate report, and Dr. Bruce R. Baxter told me he was busy on the project."

Will not call the legislature into extraordinary session until all details are straightened out and we have a program to present.

Governor Martin continued, "There is one thing certain, we must have more land and we must act before Senator McNary leaves Washington, which will be within a week, I believe."

Favor Campus Discussed

The board members discussed various proposals "off the record" upon receipt of word from McNary that the government would provide a loan and grant for additional land. The Willamette university ground, estimated at a cost of \$600,000, was the proposal most generally approved at the session here Monday.

If the state desires to acquire additional land, it may advise that loan and grant funds may be used up to 18 to 20 per cent. This subject I have discussed twice with PWA officials. If this is to be done application may be made after action upon a report pending (the 45 per cent grant toward a \$8,500,000 capitol building).

"If I knew the particular site or the amount of money in question I could probably get this assurance. Will await further instructions."

In connection with the funds for other state projects for building and improvements at the state hospital, the blind school and the tuberculosis hospitals, the board authorized a telegram to McNary asking the status of these proposals, urging funds be made available before any emergency needs could be taken care of at once. Legislative appropriations in the amount of \$230,000 have been made for these buildings.

Turning to routine business the members considered a proposal for painting of the capitol building. The paintings had been destroyed by a capitol fire. The proposal was made by the WPA administration, whereby artists would be paid by the federal government under high class supervision. The state would furnish all material. The matter was turned over to the WPA for estimates and a definite proposal. If accepted the materials would be paid for out of the restoration fund.

Medford 40-8 Train Makes Hit at State Conclave of Legion

The Medford delegation of Legionnaires to the department convention recently held at The Dalles, all returning Sunday, and many are the tales they have to tell of varied experiences undergone while at the river city.

One of the stories has to do with the tragic burning of the "hula" skirt of Olat Nelson of Oakridge, set on fire by a practical joker, and resulting in fatal injury. Cass Wymore, in the 40 or 8 freight train from this city, was nearby at the time of the burning and helped extinguish the flames and take the burned man to the hospital. He himself sustained a burned hand and singed hair.

The freight train proved popular with the crowds, many being taken for rides through the streets of The Dalles. The train was also awarded a silver cup for being the best float of its kind in the parade, the second in the history of the Medford river. Another cup, won in Klamath Falls in 1933, and the new one, are on exhibit at the Chamber of Commerce.

In taking the train to The Dalles, Wymore and Cap Martin drove north via Diamond Lake. In making the round trip they drove 1000 miles, ran over one man, had one flat tire, and a swell time, they reported today. It was nearly at the close of the highway in their haste to get home. They arrived with the train yesterday.
