BELCASTRO BALKS AT \$100 FORFEIT IF BILL REFEREES

If Bill Morgan, pro football ace, is chosen to do the refereeing Thursday night in the Armory's weekly grip and grapple card, Pete Belcastro will refuse to forfeit \$100 if he loses to Bad Boy Johnny Soos, the Italian drop-kicker himself declared today. Pete's only condition is that there be several judges at the ringside in addition to Referee Morgan.

Belcastro, who has a disliking for the popular ex-footballer, says he refuses to "take chances" on losing the \$100 with Morgan in the ring, but that he is willing to put up the coin if Promoter Lillard agrees to install the novel addition of several ring-side judges. Lillard was undecided upon the situation when approached today. The \$100 will be put up before the match, according to Belcastro.

Prospects for a good match in the other half of the double main event are drawing more and more interest in the bout scheduled between speedy Joe Hubka of Nebraska and Awful Al Karasick of Russia. Fans will be treated to a set-to between the coast's best smasher and smasher talent when these two muscles come under the spotlight. It will be a case of one of the most promising younger matmen in the country against a wrestler who once held a national title and has been in the game for practically a life-time.

Herb Bryanson, newcomer rated among the best middleweights on the coast today, will meet Floyd Wolfgram in the curtain raiser.

SENATORS TOPPLE SEALS FROM TOP OF COAST LEAGUE

The Sacramento Senators may be just a jump from the Pacific coast league cellar, but they are high-powered dynamite to the San Francisco Seals.

The Senators, who seem to acquire a notion to start winning games whenever the Seals come over to play, did it again yesterday, to topple the San Francisco club from its precarious perch at the head of the standings.

Behind the effective hurling of Tim Flynn, the Senators bunched three hits in the sixth for the pair of runs which beat the Seals 2-1. Flynn held the opposition to six scattered bingles.

The San Francisco Mission, meanwhile, were stepping into the lead with a convincing 9 to 2 victory over the third place Portland Ducks. The Mission clinched their win with three runs in each of the last two innings.

The Los Angeles Angels and the Seattle Indians both accounted for victories to maintain their fourth place tie.

Six runs bunched in the seventh and eighth innings pulled the Angels from behind to a 9-4 victory over Oakland, while the Indians went on a batting spree behind the crafty offerings of Archie Campbell to beat Hollywood, 9 to 1.

BAER-LOUIS BATTLE SOUGHT BY DETROIT WITH \$300,000 BID

NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—(AP)—This Joe Louis-Max Baer fight must loom as a pretty piece of flatbush the way the different cities are bidding for it.

Indications are that the bout will take place at the Polo Grounds in New York September 24, but Detroit, the home town of the Brown Bomber, has made an offer that is making Promoter Mike Jacobs sit back and take notice.

Frederic H. Schader announced that a group of prominent Detroit citizens would bid \$300,000 to bring the attraction to Detroit. The fight would be staged at Navin field with accommodations arranged for 85,000 persons.

Schader said the decision to underwrite the bout for this amount with a third to each of the fighters and a third to Jacobs, was reached at a meeting of Detroit business men at the Detroit Athletic Club.

Jacobs was in a huddle with the New York state athletic commission yesterday, at the latter's request. He asked to consider the matter more and said that after going further into the details today he probably would make a final decision tomorrow.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Freddie Miller, recognized by the national boxing association as feather-weight champion of the world, roared Roger Bernard of Flint, Mich., through 10 rounds last night to show 6,000 fans just how he did it through a year of fight campaigning in Europe.

It was his first appearance in an American ring since his return three weeks ago. His title was not at stake. Both men entered the ring over the 126 pound weight limit of the featherweight division. Miller scaled 128 1/4; Bernard 129 1/4.
