KEEPING COOL IN HOT WEATHER

But whichever way the luck runs, a light touch in the desert will be appropriate. If it is hot, a light dessert is inevitable, and if it is cool, a light dessert can be introduced as a contrast to the rest of the dinner.

A ready repertoire of desserts, fresh with the tang of summer fruit, with perhaps a light dessert for those who are devotees of the belle chocolate, solves the last course problem for several summertime dinners.

Placed water in top of double boiler and bring to a boil over direct heat. Combine dry ingredients; add gradually to water and bring to a brisk boil, stirring constantly. Place immediately over rapidly boiling water and cook 2 minutes, stirring occasionally. Cool—mixture clears and thickens as it cools. When slightly cool, fold in fruit (crushed, ground or forced through sieve) and lemon juice.

Gypsy Fruit Mold. 1 package orange-flavored gelatin 1 pint warm water 3 fresh peaches, sliced 1 cup blueberries.

Dissolve gelatin in warm water. Pour in thin layer into loaf mold and chill until firm. Chill remaining gelatin until thickened. Arrange peaches on firm layer and cover with thickened gelatin. Chill until firm. Add blueberries and cover with remaining gelatin. Chill until firm. Unmold and serve in slices. Serves 8. (One cup blueberries may be substituted for blueberries.)

Chocolate Velvet Cream. 1 square unsweetened chocolate 1 cup milk 1 teaspoon granulated gelatin 1/2 cup sugar 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup heavy cream 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

Add chocolate to 1/2 cup milk and heat in double boiler. Boak gelatin in remaining 1/2 cup milk 5 minutes. When chocolate is melted, heat with rotary egg beater until blended. Add gelatin, sugar, and salt, and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Cool. Add cream and vanilla. Chill until cold and syrupy. Place in bowl of cracked ice or ice water and whip with rotary egg beater until fluffy and thick like whipped cream. Turn into individual molds. Chill only until firm. Garnish with whipped cream. Serves 6.
