

BONUS VOTE DUE ON OPENING DAY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—(AP)—A note on the opening day in the next session of congress on the Patman \$2,000,000,000 bonus-inflation bill was \$2,000,000,000 today.

Backers of the bill finally obtained 217 signatures on a petition to take the bill away from the house ways and means committee and bring it to the floor for a vote. Under house rules, however, it would be impossible to obtain a vote this session unless congress meets well into September.

Rules are that after the petition is signed it must remain on the calendar seven legislative days before a vote can be had.

Votes are permissible on such petitions only on the second and fourth Mondays of each month.

Thus no vote this session will be possible.

462,000 ENROLLED IN RANKS OF CCC

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—(AP)—The civilian conservation corps announced today enlistments reached 462,000 on August 17.

Of this number 12,000 were Indians working on Indian reservations and 400 were in camps in Hawaii, Alaska, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

Enlistments by states of origin were reported as including: Arizona 2975, California 22,772, Idaho 3303, Montana 3393, Nevada 601, Oregon 6508, Washington 9055.
